A 1976 graduate of Potsdam Central High School, she was active in the theater and a member of the National Honor Society, band, and chorus. She plans to major in foreign languages.

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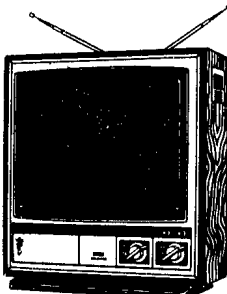
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
