REACT team to assist students

Incoming students of Clarkson College will have a new service to help them and their parents get to the campus from the highways leading into Potsdam and also to help them locate the various buildings on the campus.

In an effort to enable those new to the area to get their destination easier, the Douglas E. Pete Memorial REACT Team 3609 of Potsdam will have an information center set up at the Walker Arena on Friday, August 26, the day incoming students will arrive to commence their studies at Clarkson.

Navy announces delay entry plan

The United States Navy Recruiting Station in Potsdam has announced that their delay entry program has been extended from nine months to one full year and that now is the time for all seniors in the class of '78 to talk to one of the three recruiters for the Potsdam area.

Under this revision, an individual that is fully qualified for formal school training in the Navy can enlist now and report up to a year later.

Some of the advantages of this are, written guarantees for the job you want and reporting date figured on a day that you choose. You can serve in a non-pay status in the inactive reserves and gain seniority for pay purposes upon your active duty reporting date.

Along with this program, the Navy also announces special recruit training camps that will report for active duty on 30 June, 1978. They will receive their training at Orlando, Florida, vice the normal Great Lakes, Ill.

Graduate courses set

Two graduate education courses will be offered this fall on Saturdays by State University College at Potsdam. Frank J. Dunn, Director of Continuing Education at the college, announced that "Education 614-Technology in Education" and "Education 630-Diagnostic Techniques in Reading" will be offered in Satterlee Hall beginning on Saturday, September 10 as a means for increased convenience of classroom teachers.

The "Technology in Education" course will be taught by Norman Licht from 9 to 11:30 a.m. and will present an overview of current and projected change in the technology of teaching materials, programming and instructional systems. Media characteristics will be identified as well as an instructional strategy.

This course was inadvertently omitted from the "Night" publication which has been circulated to North Country residents.

"Diagnostic Techniques in Reading" will be taught by William Q. Davis from 9:30 a.m. until noon and will include a study of classroom and clinical techniques for diagnosis of both mild and severe reading disorders. Extensive diagnostic practice will be provided through testing of children. skill in administration and interpretation of individual pupil and group tests which will culminate in written reports. An introductory reading course is a prerequisite.

Both courses are available for three graduate credit hours. Graduate registration will be from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., August 24, in Kellas Hall and from 9:30 p.m., September 6 in Merritt Hall Gym.

Raymond R. Andrews, a member of the Clarkson Chemistry faculty and President of the Potsdam REACT announced that this service has been established in cooperation with college officials.

All incoming freshmen and transfer students have been notified that on arrival in the Potsdam area they may call the Potsdam REACT Team on CB and receive directions to the arena.

In this way many of the difficulties normally encountered in driving unfamiliar streets will be avoided.

The REACT Team will be monitoring channels, four, nine, and 19 from 8 a.m. until 6 p.m. on that day.

In addition the REACT Team will have free coffee and doughnuts at their information center at the arena for all those arriving in town.

There will also be a communications network which will enable the team to get up to the minute information on motels, hotels, restaurants, etc. for the students and their parents. Maps and information on Potsdam, surrounding towns, are attractions and recreation and camping facilities in the Seaway area will also be available.

Andrews noted that "this is one of the many ways the Potsdam REACT Team is helping visitors to the area enjoy the time spent here more profitably. Any local citizens who might wish to see this center in operation are welcome to come to the arena during that day."

Sales tax laws amended to prevent pollution

State Tax Commissioner James H. Tully, Jr., announced that the New York State Tax Commission has amended its sales tax regulations to assist businesses engaged in industrial waste treatment to prevent air and water pollution.

"Under the new regulations," said Tully, "the cost of cleaning up the environment will be considered part of the cost of production and will, therefore, be exempt from sales tax."

The Tax Commission has made important changes in Regulation 528.13 (d) which governs sales tax on certain purchases of machinery and equipment used for industrial waste treatment.

Previously, such equipment was eligible for exemption only if it was used to actually "treat" waste materials.

Now, machinery will be exempt if it is used to actually "treat, bury or store" waste material.

In the past, equipment could not qualify for a sales tax exemption unless it was used directly and predominantly to actually treat waste in order to "prevent" water or air pollution.

Machinery is now exempt if it is used as "part of a process" for preventing water or air pollution resulting from manufacturing.

As a money market, New York City is bigger than the next 25 cities combined, according to the New York State Department of Commerce.

New York, which already generates more electric power than any other state east of the Mississippi, will increase its power capacity by more than 80 percent in the next 10 years -- most of it (52 percent) by nuclear facilities. To meet the increasing needs of a growing industrial complex, 30 new power generating facilities will be completed and under construction, nine nuclear plants among them. The new facilities will increase New York's present combined private and public generating capacity of 23,500,000 kilowatts to 43,500,000. Power production will rise from the present 105,000,000,000 kilowatt-hours annually to 186,650,000,000 according to the New York State Department of Commerce.
