

Kelly tapped as swim coach by SUCP

State University College at Potsdam Athletic Director Jerry Welsh has announced the appointment of James F. Kelly, swimming coach at Churchville-Chili Central School, as Coach of Swimming and Soccer, effective immediately.

Tourney deadline is August 27

With few days remaining before the August 27 deadline for entries in The St. Lawrence National Bank's annual invitational Golf Tournament, starting positions are almost complete.

Kelly will be taking over an outstanding swimming program from the hands of Dave Allen, who has moved on to the University of North Carolina at Charlotte and a rebuilding soccer program from Neil Johnson.

In addition to his coaching duties, Kelly will also be an Instructor of Physical Education.

A 1965 graduate of St. Bonaventure University, Kelly earned his Masters Degree in Physical Education from Springfield College in 1972.

After graduating from St. Bonaventure, he taught at James Evans

Elementary in Wappingers Falls, New York, then served as an Egress Technician and Repairman in the United States Air Force from 1967 to 1971.

Upon leaving the Air Force, Kelly was a physical education instructor and coach of swimming and soccer at Genesee Community College in Batavia.

In 1974, he was promoted to Assistant Professor at the college.

He assumed his coaching duties at Churchville-Chili in 1975.

Kelly, his wife, Margaret, and their three children will reside at 41 Waverly St., Potsdam.

Haymans place high in Placid water ski tourney

Dimensions In The Martial Arts

A few weeks ago a Karate demonstration was scheduled to be held as one of the activities at the Philadelphia community fair.

This exhibition was to be presented according to the fair officials by the Members of the Zen Do Kai Karate Association out of Massena. A number of people were on hand to watch the

demonstration, including the Chief Instructor from the Watertown Judo Association and instructors from the Watertown Karate club.

Unfortunately, the demonstration never took place, it was cancelled only minutes before its scheduled time.

As representatives of the Martial Arts we were concerned about the situation and talked to some of the officials of the event. We were told that the Karate demonstration was indeed scheduled and that at the last minute the Zen Do Kai Association could not send an instructor to present the demonstration and would not allow the local students to present the program without an instructor.

It seems as though there was an apparent lack of communication between local students and the instructor which led to the cancellation of the exhibition.

It is most unfortunate that this happened because most of the disappointed public did not differentiate between Karate schools and most of the talk we heard was generally negative about Karate itself—all Karate.

It doesn't matter who was right or wrong in the situation, it matters that it happened.

It matters that people were left with a bad feeling about the martial arts. The instructors cannot be held liable to a demonstration that they didn't perhaps schedule; but that doesn't help.

The students cannot be held responsible if they did not know they could not present a demonstration without an instructor; but that doesn't help either.

The people who expected a Karate exhibition only know one thing; the Karate people didn't perform.

A Karate instructor cannot be held totally responsible for the actions of his students. A good instructor however, feels that he is responsible in that the students reflect what he is teaching them. An instructor tries to instill the discipline and traditions of the art in his students in hopes that they will present a favorable image and bring credit to the Martial Arts.

A native of Scotland, Dennett graduated in 1971 from St. Lawrence University, where he majored in physical education and was a three-year standout for Coach Bob Goodwin.

He obtained his Masters Degree in Education from St. Lawrence in 1976.

While playing under Goodwin, Dennett earned All-ICAC and All-State honors for all three years.

He was Most Valuable Player of the ICAC his junior and senior years, Most Valuable Player of the NCAA Division II playoffs, and was named All-American his senior year.

Upon graduating, Dennett was Junior Varsity Soccer Coach at St. Lawrence University, then taught physical education and coached varsity soccer at Plattsburgh State.

After working with recreation programs in Vail, Colorado, and Renton, Dunbartonshire, Scotland, he was Assistant Soccer Coach at Clarkson College in 1976.
