

NYSERDA, PASNY to study hydroelectric generation sites

The New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA) will conduct a \$168,000 study of prospects for increasing the state's hydroelectric production. The New York State Authority

providing technical expertise and part of the funding. PASNY Chairman Frederick R. Clark and NYSERDA Chairman N. Richard Werthamer said the study will concentrate on the potential for small

hydropower plants at old and new sites. These will include sites which formerly produced power or were used for other purposes and those not yet developed. The bulk of the research will be conducted by the faculty of the Polytechnic Institute of New York, which developed the proposal for the study.

Emphasis will be placed on sites with production potential in the 50 to 15,000-kilowatt range but not excluding larger sites where appropriate. The limit was suggested by the Federal Power Commission licensing office because 85 per cent of the applications it receives are for sites of less than that installed capacity.

One purpose of the project will be to select up to 20 sites offering the best potential for development as hydroelectric demonstration projects.

The project also will assess possible restoration and expansion of the productive capacity of old sites through the use of new technologies.

The project, scheduled for completion in one year, is similar to investigations undertaken by the new Federal Interagency Working Group on Hydropower and particularly by the New England

River Basin Commission, which is launching a two-year study of the possible expansion of hydroelectric capacity in New England.

PASNY, whose Niagara, St. Lawrence and Benneville-Gilboa hydro-electric projects have a combined capacity of 4,200,000 kilowatts, is one of the largest producers of hydroelectric energy in the U.S.

The project will be divided into two phases. The first phase will involve examination of records of approximately 6,350 dams in New York State with the goal of preparing a reliable estimate of the state's potential for hydropower development.

Criteria will be devised to identify sites with the most promise for rapid development. These criteria will take into account economic, institutional and environmental factors and the potential for reducing oil and natural gas consumption.

The second phase will emphasize detailed evaluation of 10 to 20 candidate sites that could serve as demonstration projects. It will examine prospects for new multi-purpose development, involving recreational, water supply, industrial, rural development and similar uses.

The project's final report will suggest opportunities for further assessment and demonstration and provide guidance for preparation of a hydroelectric development plan for New York State.

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PCS hires new staff members

New staff members at the Potsdam Central School will be greeted at a luncheon meeting scheduled for Friday, September 2, 1977. Members of the school board and administration will be introduced to the new staff. Building principals will hold orientation sessions during the day on Friday by special arrangement with their teachers.

Heading the list of new professional staff is Barbara Morrison, district curriculum coordinator-supervisor. Morrison, who began working during the summer, has been an administrator and teacher in Albany, Syracuse, and in the state of Indiana at Bloomington. She holds a degree from the University of Indiana and has completed her administrative graduate work at SUNY at Albany. She has two grown children and lives at Meadow East, Potsdam.

Steven Andrikut of Potsdam, an alumnus of St. Lawrence University, will be teaching English at the senior high school level. Andrikut has worked as a teacher-aid and as a substitute teacher at P.C.S. previously. This is his first full-time teaching position.

Mary Jane Dirs, of Amsterdam, will be teaching English in the A.A. Kingston Middle School. She holds degrees from SUC Oneonta, and has held a variety of part-time jobs prior to becoming a teacher. This is her first full-time teaching position.

David Wilson, who was graduated from SUC Brockport in June, will become a teacher of physical education at the middle school filling in for one year while Mike Loconti, the regular staff member, is on sabbatical leave. Wilson, a Potsdam native has worked as a hockey instructor and official, and has held other jobs while in college.

Lorraine Ford, who received her degree from Potsdam SUC in 1976, will become a teacher in the Lawrence Avenue School. She has done substitute teaching in local systems, is married and is the mother of three school-aged children. She has been active as a girl scout leader, and as a tutor at St. Lawrence Central School. This is her first teaching position on a full-time basis.

Anne Heeren, from Appleton, Wisconsin, will teach in the elementary school at the primary level. Heeren is an experienced teacher, having taught in Princeton and in New Brunswick, New Jersey; in Locust Valley, New York, and Riverside, California; and in Appleton, Wisconsin, where she went in 1968. Mrs. Wright has had nearly ten years teaching experience in California before moving to this area two years ago. She has a A.A. degree in music and a B.A. in speech arts with a music minor. She has done graduate work in California and is now doing additional work in reading at Potsdam SUC.

Henry Kriescher will be teaching social studies at the senior high school. Kriescher, a native of Wisconsin, holds a degree from St. Louis University and a masters in history from Marquette. He is certified to teach in science, math, elementary grades, and social studies. His experience includes teaching in a native American school in South Dakota, physical education and coaching instruction in Wisconsin, and high school teaching at Shelter Island, where he did coaching in track and basketball. He has extensive post-graduate credit in a variety of disciplines.

Potsdam administrators are continuing to interview for the position of substitute teacher in industrial arts at the high school and teacher of reading, also at the high school level. It is expected that these positions will be filled by the first school day.
