Funeral services for Maude Greenwood, 83, of Route 4, Potsdam, were held Monday, August 29 at St. Mary's Church. Burial was in St. Mary's Cemetery.

Maude Greenwood died Friday, August 26, 1977 at the Potsdam Hospital, where she had been a patient for a month.

Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Jerry (Merlene) Taylor of Riverdale, and Mrs. Winton (Mildred) Smith of Brasher Falls; two sisters, Mrs. Jenny Caskinette of Potsdam and Mrs. Sarah Caskinette of Syracuse; a brother, Guy of Brasher Falls and eight grandchildren. Cover crop seeding pilot project set

The St. Lawrence County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, in cooperation with the County Extension Service is sponsoring a pilot project in the Stockholm-Lawrence area on seeding a cover crop of winter rye on established corn.

Baker Elliott of Elliott's Agway in Winthrop contracted for 561 bushels of rye seed and Dustaire Inc. of Vermont will fly the seed on the farms of: Daniel Derakon, James Downs, Carl Eames, Gary Roberts, Sanford Stauffer and Lawrence Wagstaff, Jr. the last of August.

Some area farmers are losing topsoil every year through erosion—especially on land seeded to row crops every year.

A cover crop of winter rye will protect the soil, help control erosion, and hold the nutrients. Planting the rye in August will give it a chance to grow. Aerial seeding is the only way to plant rye in a field of shoulder high corn.

Seeding by air will provide ideal germination conditions for the winter rye and standing corn. When the corn is harvested the air-seeded plants should be about six inches tall and healthy. The crop will die off with the first frost and return in the spring. In the spring the rye can either be plowed under to provide a fertile base for the next corn crop or can be pastured.

Since this is a high priority practice, the Agricultural Conservation Program cost-share is 75 percent of the actual cost of seed and the seeding operation. This cover can not be destroyed prior to April 1, 1978.
