Francis and his young wife and children were living in a log cabin at Ringville, in Franklin County, in 1862. When the Civil War broke out, he was sent word to join up with the Volunteers marching through. He enlisted with the Northern New York Volunteers at Malone, or Plattsburgh. While engaged in the war, he was shot in the leg, and later received an Honorable Discharge, and returned home to his family.

The oldest living descendant of Francis Wolfe is Mrs. Lana Mason, who attended from Parish. She is active and happy, and 90 years young; the only surviving grandchild. Fourth, fifth and sixth generations are in various parts of the country.

After a delicious picnic dinner, music and some "good old fashion visiting," a short business meeting was called to order by John Wolfe III and Lorna of Norfolk, Chairpersons for the Reunion. 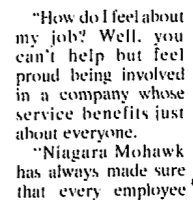

In operation since 1963, The University Inn, Canton, has established itself as one of the North Country's premier restaurant and motel facilities.

Located at the corner of Routes 68 and 11 on the campus of St. Lawrence University, The University Inn features a motel with 75 rooms, swimming pool, restaurant and tavern. It's also only a chip shot away from the St. Lawrence Golf and Country Club fairways.

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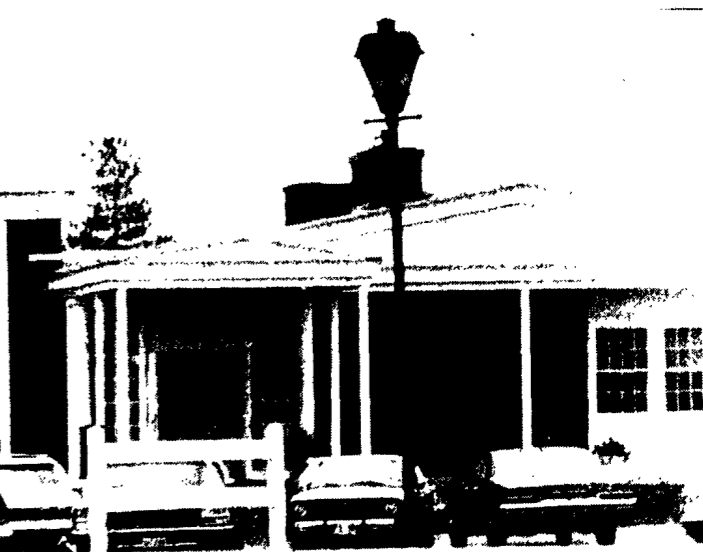
