Alcoholism seminar planned for clergy

The St. Lawrence County Alcohol Referral Service is offering a one-day seminar on alcoholism for all clergy in the North Country on September 26 at the Newman Center, 41 Main Street, Potsdam.

This program is designed specifically for the clergy to enable them to better assist their church members who have, or are living with, the disease of alcoholism. Historically, church involvement in the area of alcoholism has been prominent. It is hoped that this seminar will provide the clergy with a better understanding of the disease. Some practical methods to improve their attempts with those who are suffering from this widespread illness will be included.

The following topics will be covered: How to recognize alcoholism, how to confront the alcoholic, how and where to refer them for help and how to provide the necessary follow-up care after treatment.

Clergy assistance is highly valued in the supportive treatment of alcoholism and in the prevention area as well. The goal of this seminar, is to give the clergy some awareness and guidance in providing help for their congregations.

The program will run from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. There is a registration fee of \$2.75 which includes lunch. For reservations and further information contact Joanne Clemmo, 265-6190 at the Alcohol Referral Service.

Wadhams Hall opens

Wadhams Hall Seminary-College opened Sunday, August 27 for the fifty-third consecutive year, with 83 students enrolled. Fifty-five returning students were joined by 18 new freshmen and 10 new upper classmen. The seminary's total enrollment is down 12 percent from last year's beginning enrollment of 94.

Father John Hunt, Director of Admissions, noted several reasons for the lower enrollment. Recruitment was slow in some areas, particularly in Western New York. Twelve previous students withdrew who might otherwise have been enrolled. Also this year 28 percent of the applicants were turned down in admissions compared to only 19 percent last year.

Wadhams Hall students come from New Jersey, New England, Pennsylvania, Ontario and New York. The dioceses represented include Ogdensburg, Albany, Burlington, Buffalo, Erie, Kingston, Paterson, Providence, Syracuse, and Camden. Also involved in Wadhams Hall are several religious communities, the Pallotine Fathers, the Oblates and Mary Immaculate and the Mary Knoll Fathers.

Hunt observed that enrollment patterns for Wadhams Hall have followed a similar pattern over the past ten years. Usually every four years there is a large dip. 1977-78 is the fourth year in a cycle. Asked about next year's prospects, Hunt noted that inquiries for fall 1978 are already far ahead of last year at this time.

Applications for senior employment

The Employment and Training Department is now accepting applications for training through the Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP), announced Carlton L. Doane, Program Director.

The program is open to individuals 55 years of age and over who meet the poverty income guidelines. Annual family income for a one-person family unit should not exceed \$2,970 for a non-farm family or \$2,550 for a farm family.

For family units with more than one member, add \$900 for each additional member in a non-farm family and \$810 for each additional member in a farm family.

This program is designed on a 20-hour week at basic minimum wage, with limited benefits. Work training slots are located entirely within non-profit organizations. There are various openings within St. Lawrence County.

There are presently two openings through the program with the Town of Waddington. Individuals may make contact with Robert Quilter, Program Coordinator at 379-2246 or Albert Wright, Town Supervisor for more information. Applications may be obtained at the Waddington Public Library concerning these openings.

The training program is subcontracted by the St. Lawrence County Board of Legislators from the National Council on the Aging, Inc. of Washington, D.C. Applications for program participation may be obtained from the Employment Service offices located in Ogdensburg and Massena.

Physical Education Plan for the coming year. The plan was put together by James Rishe Athletic Director for the district, with the assistance of several other physical education teachers.

According to the report there will be 513 students in the Madrid Elementary school this fall, 300 in the Waddington Elementary school and 579 in the Junior Senior high school. Combining all three schools there will be a total of 1,392 students entering the district school this fall.

Areas covered in Physical Education at Madrid Waddington schools include: wrestling, soccer, basketball, volleyball, cheerleading and elementary track in grades 4-7.

Gymnastics, soccer, volleyball, softball, tennis, horseshoes, ping-pong, paddleball, bowling, skiing and co-ed volleyball, are open for grades 8-12.

There is also girls soccer, girls volleyball and girls cross country.

The district plan for family eligibility criteria for free and reduced price meals and free milk for the upcoming school year was adopted.

Figures listed in part include: A family unit of one may qualify for a free lunch if the income is \$3,930 per year or less, or a reduced price if the yearly earnings are \$6,120 or less. Families with two units may have an income of \$5,160 for free lunch or \$8,050 for reduced lunch; a family unit of three may have an income of \$6,390 for the lunch, an income of \$9,970 for the reduced lunch; and a family unit of four qualifies for the free lunch if its yearly income is \$7,610 or a reduced lunch if the income is \$11,880.
