Kilcoyne seeks legislature seat

Anthony J. Kilcoyne, Vocational Agriculture Teacher at St. Lawrence Central School, Brasher Falls, has announced that he is a candidate for St. Lawrence County Legislator for District 4. This covers the towns of Brasher, Hopkinton, and Lawrence.
Mr. Kilcoyne is a graduate of Cornell University, with a B.S. Degree from the College of Agriculture. He has done graduate work at Cornell University, St. Lawrence University and the State University College at Potsdam.

He served four years in the U.S. Army, attaining the rank of Captain in the armored field artillery. While in the Asiatic Pacific Theatre, he was given the responsibility of Base Motor Officer on the island of Leyte in the Philippines. He organized and supervised the operation and maintenance of all base trucks and material handling equipment. He also supervised the training of the army and civilian personnel assigned to the Base Depot.
Prior to teaching Vocational Agriculture, he was with the New York State Cooperative Extension Service as an Assistant County Agricultural Agent and County 4-H Club Agent. While in Chenango County, he organized a large group of young Adult Farmers, helping them with their economic and agricultural production problems. As a County 4-H Club Agent he stressed Leadership among the rural youth and adult groups in the 4-H Club program. Kilcoyne's Vocational Agriculture Department members have been very active in County and State FFA work. Many of his former students have gone into farming or professional work in the field of Agribusiness.
