Social security information free

Some advertisers mislead people into thinking that only their firm can provide accurate and up to date information about social security for a price, according to John G. Joly, social security district manager, in Ogdensburg.

This simple is not true, Joly stated. People can get the most accurate and most up to date information about social security free at any social security office. These offices have a variety of publications, describing all aspects of the social security programs of retirement, survivor, and disability insurance benefits, Medicare, and the supplemental security income (SSI) program.

Some advertisers will offer to obtain a statement of a worker's social security earnings if that person will buy a book or subscribe to a magazine. A person can get a post-card form to request a statement of earnings free at any social security office and at many other locations. There is no fee nor is there a need to buy anything to get this service, Joly added. A social security employee will never ask for a fee for performing

any service, Joly stressed. Joly noted that just recently the local office received a complaint that a salesman called at a person's home and gave the impression he was from the Social Security Administration. Complaints similar to this are received from time to time. Unfortunately, the complaint was received after the salesman left.

A social security employee will be glad to show identification. If a person is still not satisfied the individual is from social security, he or she should call the local office and verify identification. Any social security employee will welcome the call to enable you to verify his or her identification. Joly noted that such calls should be made while the person is still at the home since it is a federal offense to pretend to be a social security employee. A prompt call can assist the Social Security Administration and law enforcement agencies in verifying the severity of the impersonation and in taking whatever action is necessary.
