Tax rates up in MWCS districts

The tax rates for the Madrid-Waddington School District will be up in all cases this coming school year. Increases are as follows: Lisbon \$100.53 as compared with \$90.25 last year, an increase of \$10.28; Louisville \$101 as compared to \$91.17, and increase of \$9.83; Madrid \$32.24 as compared to \$30.91, an increase of \$1.33; Potsdam \$83.07 in contrast to \$76.83; an increase of \$6.24 and Waddington's \$94.12 in contrast to \$89.69 an increase of \$4.43. These tax rates were approved in a special meeting of the Madrid Waddington Board of Education held Tuesday night.

The rate on true evaluation is .01698669 this year in comparison with last year's rate of .01720294.

The school district is comprised of the towns of Waddington, Madrid as well as sections of Potsdam and Louisville Townships. In other action Alan Pierce was elected as the official voting delegate to this year's New York State School Board Association meeting in Syracuse. The meeting will be held beginning Saturday morning, October 15 and concluding on Monday evening, October 17.

Burton Beswick was elected as the alternate. According to present plans, seven members of the board will attend along with the Chief School Administrator, Maurice Cressey. Janice Hobkirk of Madrid and Kim's Taxi service were both awarded contracts to transport handicapped students for the district to Heuvelton and Twin Rivers in Massena. Theirs were the low bids.

Norwood library sponsors toy classes

The Norwood Library will sponsor a series of four toy making classes to be held at the Library at 9:30 a.m. on each of the four Thursdays in the month of September.

The teacher, Mrs. Spencer Moon, has limited the size of the class to 12 persons. There is no charge for the two-hour classes, funded by the New York State Council on the Arts.

Interested persons are asked to contact the librarians as soon as possible to indicate their interest. Enrollment will be on a first-come basis.

The first class will be held on September 8; general instruction on toy making including types of stitches, making and using a pattern for a toy to be taken home. Materials to bring are: pencil, ruler, needle and thread, thimble, embroidery floss and needle, scissors.

The second class will be held on September 15; making flat toys with only two sides, making toys with

gussets, working with fur. Bring needle, thread, thimble, scissors and any material you desire to use to make the toys.

The third class is scheduled for September 22; making a pattern for a doll, making a pattern for doll clothes. Bring material for doll clothes and your sewing equipment.

On September 29 the topics knitted toys. A soft toy will be made. Bring one skein of two-ply yarn and number 2-3 needles.

NNCS announces free lunch, milk program

Norwood-Norfolk Central Schools District today announced a free and reduced price meal and or free special milk policy for Norwood-Norfolk Central School children unable to pay the full price.

Local school officials have adopted the following family eligibility criteria to assist them in determining eligibility.

Families falling within the eligibility criteria, which provides for adjustment for uncontrollable financial hardships are urged to apply for free or reduced price meals and or free special milk for their children. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents.

Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school.

Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. The form itself requests information needed to determine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family and any uncontrollable financial hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school meals and or special milk.

Provision is included for foster children. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility, school officials noted.

Under the provisions of the policy the designated official will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the designated official, he may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision.

The Supervising Principal has been designated as the Hearing Official. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy. Prior to initiating the hearing procedure, the parent or School Food Authority may request a conference to provide an opportunity for the parent and official to discuss the situation, present information, and obtain an explanation of the data submitted in the

application or the decisions rendered. The request for a conference will not in any way prejudice or diminish the right to a fair hearing.

The policy also provides that there will be no identification or or discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of a lunch. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of his race, sex, color, or national origin.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school principal's office and in the office of School Food Authority District Administrator where it may be reviewed by any interested persons.

Harold Hippen will run for GOP nod as Stockholm highway super

Harold F. Hippen, a lifetime resident of the Town of Stockholm, is a Republican candidate for the office of Highway Superintendent in the Town of Stockholm for Primary Election on Thursday, September 8.

Hippen is married to the former Anita Hubschmitt of Clifton, N.J. The couple have been married for 38 years and are the parents of five children. He served for 12 years on the Stockholm Town Board as a Republican

Councilman. He was employed by the Stockholm Highway Department from 1930-40. Hippen owned and operated a dairy farm and hauled milk for 16 years. He was also employed by the St. Lawrence County Highway Department.

For the past 12 years, Hippen has been a self-employed trucker, working for the Warren Brothers Road Construction Company of Syracuse.

The capsule will be appropriately marked with a piece of Potsdam Sandstone indicating that this was a Bicentennial project and is to be opened in the year 2076.
