

Rev. Kelley to address congress

The Reverend Joseph Kelley, O.S.A. will be the keynote speaker at the seventh annual Liturgy-Music Congress, Celebrate '77, sponsored by the Department of Worship of the diocese of Ogdensburg. Setting the stage for the day's activities, Father Kelley's keynote address will explore the theme of ministry and is titled, Charisma and Need: the Growth of Presence.

Father Kelley, professor of Religious Studies and Associate Campus minister at Merrimac College, North Andover, Massachusetts, has an excellent background of liturgical education and extensive practical knowledge of liturgy. A member of the Austinian order and a graduate of Villanova University, he received his M.A. in Liturgical Studies at Catholic University in Washington, D.C. where he worked with the Bishops' Committee on the Liturgy.

In the summer of 1975, he served in England as an advisor to the International Committee on English in the Liturgy (ICEL). For the past two summers, he has been an instructor in the graduate liturgy program at St. Joseph's College in Rensselaer, Indiana.

Marshall Lewis to speak at Clarkson

Marshall C. Lewis, director of Corporate Communications at Union Carbide, New York City, will be participating in Freshman Forum during a visit to Clarkson College September 12-13. An English program, Forum involves learning human values, communication skills, and reading for pleasure.

Lewis will also address the public Tuesday, September 13, at Snell Auditorium. His speech, which will begin at 7 p.m., will stress the importance of communication skills.

Lewis will discuss the amount of communication required from an average employee, the different types of writing (from memos to financial reports), and how a person's ability to communicate in speech and writing affect advancement in rank or salary. Lewis joined Union Carbide in 1976. He is a member of the Public Information Committee of the Business Roundtable, Public Relations Society of America, and Joint Council on Economic Education, and was formerly chairman of the Forest Industries Council Communications Committee.

Past Forum participants have included Norman Beach, vice president of Eastman Kodak, and John Mathias, a poet from Notre Dame University.

Sharon Gothams was named Mental Health Association Campaign Chairperson for South Colton.

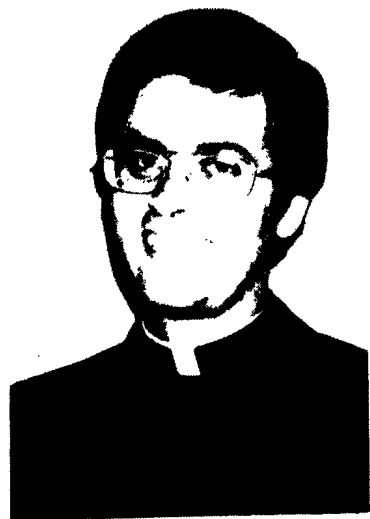
As campaign chairperson Gothams will organize Bellringer volunteers to go house-to-house during September, Mental Health Month in New York State.
