

'Opportunity College' Will Let Adults Take Courses

Dr. Thomas Hegarty, vice president for academic affairs at State University College at Potsdam, has announced a new admissions policy for undergraduate students who are not seeking a bachelor's degree.

The new policy will permit adults who have not been enrolled at another college or at a high school within the last three years and who do not have an interest, at this time, in obtaining a bachelor's degree, to be admitted to the Potsdam College and permitted to take up to 30 hours of undergraduate courses.

Hegarty said, "This new policy will give a fresh opportunity to many people in the North Country who have been unable to go to college for whatever reason and will provide the college with an additional student population."

The policy was developed under the guidance of Dr. Thomas Barrington, outgoing Potsdam president, by the office of continuing education and the

admissions office.

Dr. Frank J. Dunn, director of continuing education, said, "There is a national trend for adults to take college courses on a part-time basis. This new policy will help North Country adults get started or 're-started'. That's why the new policy is called 'opportunity college'."

Adults who are interested in applying for admission under this new policy need to contact the Office of Continuing Education, which will administer the new policy, 622 Raymond Hall, or call (315) 268-3197.

A simple application form can then be completed. No interviews or examinations are necessary.

Examples of some late afternoon or evening courses available this fall for

the new prospective adult student are, Education of the Exceptional Child, Education for the Layman, Citizens' Guide to Public Issues, Shakespeare, Riddles of the Past (anthropology), Landscape in Art, Consumer Economics, Introduction to Psychology, Drug Studies, Parenting, Introduction to Religion, Computers and Music, Modern German Masterpieces in Translation and three television courses: The Long Search: A Study of Religion, The Growing Years (Developmental Psychology), and Introduction to Film: Cinematic Eye.

Many of the courses meet only once a week, others will meet two or three times per week. Some of the TV courses will require three or four seminars.
