

Probation Group Takes Canoe Trek

On July 2, St. Lawrence County Probation Officer Walter Paul and six youths involved with the Probation Department left the Sabattis Boy Scout Camp to begin a canoe trek through the wilderness between Long Lake and Tupper Lake, a distance in excess of 50 miles.

The trip was sponsored by the Probation Department, in conjunction with the Explorer group of the St. Lawrence Valley Boy Scout Council, and was funded in part by the St. Lawrence County Community Development Programs, Inc.

This project was conceived last April when a special Explorer Post 451 was chartered in order that the Probation Department could operate a special Outward Bound project for certain young people who were at that time involved with the Probation Department. Don Zeeb, a senior probation officer and a one-time affiliate of scouting, assisted in the initial planning.

The purpose of the project was to introduce the youngsters to techniques of camping, canoeing, and enjoyment of the outdoors. In addition, it was intended to provide experience in alternate leisure time activities and teach the boys something about themselves and the importance of group cooperation. After the youths, aged 15 to 17 were

selected, a great deal of planning and training was involved. The training included an introduction to first aid and canoe paddling techniques as well as other survival skills necessary in the wilderness. These young people were also committed to earning a certain portion of the cost of the project and earned over \$75 in a variety of group fundraising activities. With the assistance of William Flanders, executive director of the St. Lawrence County C.D.P., camperships were made available for the purchase of necessary equipment.

The caravan of four canoes which included Paul and John Ryan, a guide affiliated with the Explorers, left the

Long Lake area on the second of July and proceeded down the Racquette River averaging 12 miles a day. According to Paul at the end of each day the group was quite tired and after the tents were erected and dinner was finished a little relaxation around the campfire was all that was necessary for a good night's rest.

The project was enjoyable to all and will long provide memories to those who participated. Other benefits? Only time will tell what other benefits will be derived from the trip, but certainly each individual learned something about himself and got to share an experience with someone else.

As part of the community service aspect of the trip, the group picked up trash along the canoe trail for the beautification of the Adirondacks. Each member of the group will receive a "50 Mile Afloat Award", from the Boy Scout Council for their participation in the program.

Jobs Opening In CETA Office

CANTON—There are a number of openings in the county's Department of Employment and Training, and there will be tests given on Sept. 30 for the jobs.

Open are 13 positions for manpower counselors, and three positions for senior manpower counselors. Also, there are anticipated vacancies for intake counselors, and a test will be given for those jobs.

The tests will be given at 9 a.m. on Sept. 30. Candidates will be notified of the place of the examinations.

Candidates for the senior manpower jobs must have graduated from an accredited college with a bachelor's degree in social science, human services, or related field, and have one year of fulltime employment in a related job; or have completed at least 60 semester credit hours in an accredited college; or have an equivalent combination of training and experience. A master's degree may be substituted for two years' experience. These jobs pay between \$10,652 and \$13,123.

Candidates for the manpower counselor jobs must have graduated with an associate degree and have one year of volunteer or paid work experience in related fields. These jobs pay between \$8,105 and \$9,847.

Public Invited To Events For Learning And Fun At ATC

CANTON—The Canton ATC campus will be the scene of extravagant entertainment and activity for the public during September and October.

In two separate programs, the public will have the opportunity to attend the North Country Folklife Festival on Sept. 30, followed by the Canton ATC-North Country Week open house the entire week of Oct. 14 through 20.

The North Country Folklife Festival, sponsored by the Center for the Study of North Country Folklife at ATC, will feature arts and crafts that have become traditional to the North Country culture. These include blacksmithing; rug weaving, braiding, and hooking; wood and bird decoy carving; and the art of making soap, dolls, sweetgrass baskets, axe handles, boats, shingles, cedar oil, maple sugar candy.

A variety of music will be provided during the day and evening including singing and dancing and bluegrass music. There will be workshops in banjo, fiddle and percussion. And there will be a musical show in the evening including The Teachout Family of Pulaski with their string band, Martin's Breakdown playing old-time bluegrass, and a Scottish Pipe Band.

Canton ATC-North Country Week The week-long open house on campus will be kicked off by the traditional Parents' Day on Oct. 14, when parents of

ATC students, as well as the public at large, are invited to visit classrooms and to have discussions with faculty, staff, and students. On Oct. 15, there will be a Readers' Theater in the Student Union Lounge.

The featured speaker of the day will be Richard Murphy, underwater photographer with the Jacques Cousteau team. He will show films and slides in a program entitled "The Coral City."

The final day of the week is High School Day, designed especially for high school students and counselors. The high school counselors will hear several recruiters from the business community who come to ATC to hire graduates.

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Management For Librarians Is Clarkson Institute Topic

Running a library is much like running any business, but management skills are not part of the typical library science curriculum. The U.S. Office of Education is making it possible for 48 librarians from 13 Northeastern states to learn some of the basic skills and concepts of management at Clarkson College this week. A grant to two School of Management Professors, Michael R. W. Bommer and J. Ronald Frazer, is funding an institute, Management for Librarians.

The institute consists of a series of workshops on decision analysis, employee relations, leadership, small group behavior, organizational change, and future directions of library and information systems. These workshops

are augmented by a series of experiential learning sessions employing library management simulation exercises and cases.

Institute instructors include Professors Bommer, Frazer, Eugene Fodor, and Peter Vegliani, all of the School of Management; and Dr. Walter Grattidge, director of Clarkson's Educational Resources Systems Project; Donald King, president of King Research, Inc.; and Duane Webster, director of the Office of University Library Management Studies, the Association of Research Libraries.

The librarians, who hold middle-to-upper level managerial positions at large academic and public libraries were selected from over 250 applicants.
