Clarkson Chemists Present Papers

Professor Peter Zuman of Clarkson's chemistry department and three of his graduate students recently delivered six papers at the Northeast Regional Meeting of the American Chemical Society in Boston, Mass. According to Professor Zuman, it is unusual for any research group to have such a number of papers accepted for presentation at these meetings.

The three students, James F. Rusing, Neal Sleszynski, and Elizabeth Woodman, and Professor Zuman reported on using spectrophotometric (optical) methods and polarographic (electrochemical) methods to follow some chemical reactions of organic compounds for which the composition of reacting compounds is at present not understood. Deborah Murphy, Deborah Hart, and Karl Bratin, all Clarkson undergraduates, participated on these research projects. In one of his papers, Zuman reported discovering that a simple reaction used as a synthetic method to prepare acids and alcohols in industry for over 150 years was described incorrectly in all chemistry textbooks.
