Stockholm Town Board Delays On Grange

STOCKHOLM—The St. Lawrence County Pomona Grange has asked the Stockholm Town Board to support legislation that would make the Grange Hall exempt from taxes, but the town board wants more information before they take any action.

The board, at their latest meeting, put off any action on the matter. The Grange had requested that the board send a letter to Gov. Hugh Carey supporting the tax exemption bill.

In other action, Town Highway Superintendent David Gebro reported that the town highway department has completed work on the approach to the Nichols Road Bridge. The St. Lawrence County Highway Department has finished work on the bridge itself. The town highway department has now started work on the Pearl Bridge Road near the Lloyd Thompson residence.

In a related matter, the board filled

the vacant position of deputy highway superintendent by appointing Fay Gary to the post. The position has been vacant since Larry Russell resigned on June 21.

Highway Superintendent Gebro requested that Gary be appointed.

In other business, it was reported that town officials made a tour of the town roads with Sam Shambert to check the roadways to see if the Nicholville Telephone Co. has put them back in condition after work in those areas.

Town board members and county legislator Augustus Marscher recently traveled to Star Lake to inspect buildings on the Schuler Estate. The estate was recently sold to the State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC), and officials went to see if they would be interested in acquiring any of the buildings on the estate for use in the township.

Warren Goodnow, of the W.B. Goodnow Insurance Agency, was present at the meeting to explain the town's insurance coverage.

Marscher announced that the Board of Equalization rate for the Town of Stockholm has been established at 11.88.

Town Supervisor Edward Tanner presided at the meeting. The next meeting of the Stockholm Town Board will be 6:30 p.m. Aug. 8 in the Municipal Building, Winthrop.

Youth Conservation Corps Applications Now Being Accepted

Local governments and nonprofit organizations planning to sponsor a Youth Conservation Corps Program next summer can now submit applications to the state Department of Environmental Conservation. Deadline for submission of local proposals for the 1978 YCC program is Nov. 1.

Applications will be accepted from any public organization which administers nonfederal public lands and waters. Projects should be designed to develop or conserve natural resources. This summer \$1,995,000 is being shared by 63 locally sponsored projects

and two sponsored by the Department of Environmental Conservation. Grants may cover up to 80 percent of the eligible cost of the project.

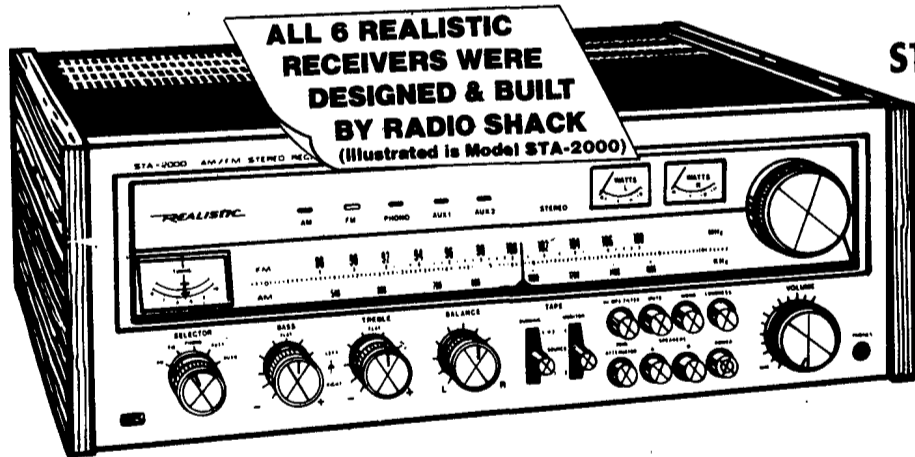
The youth Conservation Corps is open to youths aged 15 to 18 of all social economic and racial classifications. Successful applicants are randomly selected.
