Ni-Mo Earnings Up For Year

SYRACUSE—For the 12 months ending June 30, 1978, earnings per share of Niagara Mohawk Power Corporation increased to \$1.84, compared to \$1.74 for the same period last year, according to Jon G. Haehl, Jr., president and chief executive officer.

Income available for common stockholders in the respective 12-month comparisons was \$105,288,000 in 1978 and \$96,365,000 in 1977. Despite including a full year's impact of previous rate adjustments, earnings for the 1978 period were about 20 percent below PSC-authorized levels.

The utility's second quarter earnings rose to 49 cents per share of common stock from 40 cents per share recorded in second quarter 1977. Haehl said that the improved quarterly earnings came primarily from increased gas and electric sales resulting from colder weather than a year ago, and increased electric sales to other utilities.

Niagara Mohawk income available for common stock reached \$25,290,000 for the quarter, up from \$22,459,000 in the same three months of 1977.

Average number of common shares outstanding during the quarter reached 58,139,001, as the utility continued to issue additional shares to help finance its construction projects. Some 56,097,640 common shares were outstanding in the second quarter of 1977. Overall electric sales to Niagara Mohawk's own customers edged upward about three percent during the quarter, confirming projections included in the utility's revised sales forecast. Residential customers increased kilowatt-hour use by 6.7 percent, with most of this growth coming from the use of electricity for heating. Commercial use rose 6.4 percent; but industrial consumption declined 1.3 percent.

Total gas sales increased 17 percent with residential customer usage posting a 13.6 percent gain, commercial use rising 28.8 percent and industrial sales climbing 10.8 percent.
