RUSSELL—A 22-year-old Russell man was killed early Tuesday morning when he was struck by a car, sheriff's deputies report.

Deputies said that the man, Lynn Doty, 22, was killed when he was hit at about 2:30 a.m. on Route 62 in the hamlet of Russell. He was hit by a car driven by Carol Lawall, 27, Russell, deputies said.

Ms. Lawall was returning home after visiting friends when she came upon Doty lying in the roadway in the center of her lane of traffic, she told investigating officers. There was no way she could avoid hitting him, she reportedly explained.

Doty was pronounced dead at 3:30 a.m. by Dr. John Shields in Canton. No criminal action is pending in the incident, although the investigation is continuing, deputies said. Detective Sgt. Carpenter and deputies Hollinger and Jones investigated.

The public is invited to the Sunday evening service.

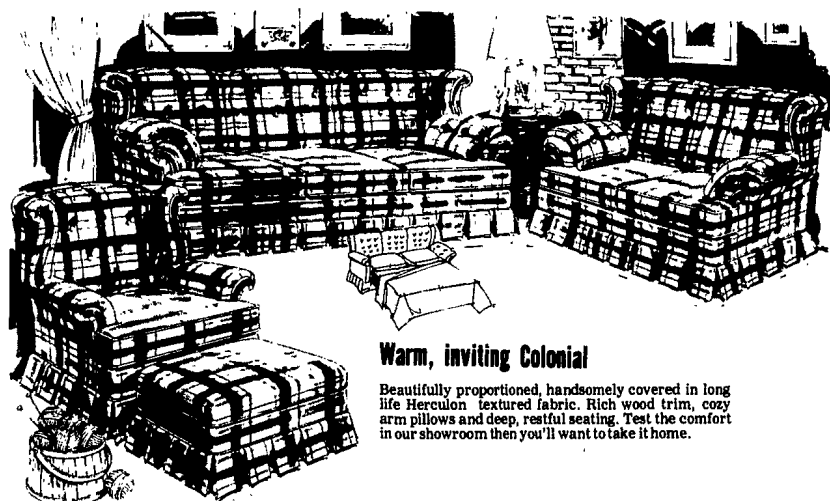
