Town Planning Board

Colton's Town Planning Board met on Aug. 15 with all members present except Don Warner.

On the agenda was amending some of the original requirements to comply with recommendations made by the Town Board at their June meeting. Some of them are: sizes for Wildwood Area (Riehl Road and Bicknell Ave.) would now be three acres; Residential Rural would be three acres, and Town's Board's request to "Eliminate yellow area around park, change to orange category-two acres," the planning board considers changing this to five acres.

Glen Thomas, chairman of the Planning Board, points out that it is hard for the public to understand some of the categories and terms used, unless they consult the book which has been accessible to all. Most of us have them by now. Thomas indicated that some points are still negotiable and on Aug. 28 there will be a special meeting of the Planning Board, open to the public, at which time they will write up the Planning Board proposals in order that the Town Board may have it to act on at their September meeting.
