

Skaters' Jump Leads Off Winter Carnival

The first event scheduled for the 14th Annual Tri-Town Carnival, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce Feb. 15-18, will be the skater's jumping contest at the Community Center, Winthrop, at 5 p.m. Feb. 15.

This contest will have four classes: boys in grades 7, 8, and 9; girls in grades 7, 8, and 9; boys in grades 10, 11, and 12 and girls in grades 10, 11 and 12.

This will be a broad jump where the contestants will jump over imaginary barrels on skates with the one jumping the furthest winning a trophy. Trophies will be awarded in all four classes.

Immediately following the Skater's Jumping Contest, the opening ceremonies for the weekend event will be held at the Community Center at approximately 5:30 p.m. Town officials and legislators will be present.

Chariman of the Winter Carnival, Randy Sundberg, will welcome the people and Queen Traci Hinton and King Steve Smith will cut the ribbon for the official opening of the Winter Carnival.

Pool Tournament
The Pool Tournament which is being held at the Tri-Town Winter Carnival will start Feb. 15 and will run throughout the weekend.

Dennis Foley, coordinator for the tournament, announced that teams should sign up by 7 p.m. Feb. 15 at any of the following participating establishments: Kengor in Brasher Center, Poirier's Helena House in Helena, Carvel's Tavern and Montroy's Restaurant in North Lawrence and Ward's Hotel in Brasher Falls. Entry fee is \$2 per person and both men and women are invited to enter at as many places as they wish. Teams will be scheduled at their convenience and they are asked to check at the establishment where they enter.

The official set of Winter Carnival rules will be posted at each of the participating bars and money for the pool tables will be furnished by the proprietors. Best two out of three games will rule and the play-offs will be held starting at 4 p.m. Feb. 18. Cash prizes will be awarded on a percentage basis.
