

Women's Shelter Expands, Moves

CANTON- The county's women's shelter has expanded, with a move to a new building and the hiring of four staff members.

Marianne Randjelovic, director of the Women's Shelter and Personal Assistance Task Force, announced the opening of the shelter's new facilities at 3 Chapel Street in Canton.

For the past two years, North Country Women has provided a similar service for area women at 19 Main Street in Canton.

Last year, through the volunteer efforts of North Country Women, emergency housing and referral services were provided for women in the county. This year, with the approval of CETA funding, the shelter is able to expand its services.

The shelter has been interviewing people in the area, and to date the following appointments have been made:

-Administrative assistant: Michele Kingston. Ms. Kingston will be responsible for assisting the director in the administration of the project. She will be checking the project's adherence to CETA guidelines, scheduling and supervising staff and outreach workers, as well as training the staff. Ms. Kingston has work experience as a social worker, been a recreation instructor at Binghamton and St. Lawrence Psychiatric Centers and has also been employed as a teacher.

-Domicile director: Linda Whitehill. Her responsibilities will include the management and upkeep of the shelter's facilities, establishing cooking, cleaning and laundry systems, and maintaining supplies, household items and furnishings. Ms. Whitehill owned and operated a large dairy farm for a number of years.

-Outreach worker: Barbara Scott. It will be Ms. Scott's responsibility for making the shelter's services known throughout the county through individual and agency contacts. She will provide follow-up contacts and services for individuals who have contacted the shelter and will also provide transportation for women who need it. Ms. Scott attended A.T.C.

-Bookkeeper-typist: Rebecca Wilson. Ms. Wilson will be responsible for the maintenance of financial records, payroll, timesheets, and general office duties.

The shelter is planning an open house in the near future. Anyone desiring more information is requested to call 315-386-4130.

Randjelovic said that the new house is larger, has more bedrooms, office space, storage space, a large kitchen area, compared to the other quarters.

Nuke Broke World Records: NiMo

SYRACUSE--Niagara Mohawk's nuclear Unit No. 1 at Nine Mile Point on Lake Ontario achieved world and U.S. performance records in 1978, saving upstate electric consumers up to \$70 million that would have been added to their bills in 1978 if the same energy had been produced at a coal or oil-fired generating plant, Niagara Mohawk has announced.

Thomas J. Perkins, Nine Mile Point station superintendent, noted, "NM's nuclear Unit No. 1, in safe, dependable service for nearly a decade, produced more than 4.46-billion kilowatt-hours in 1978. Generating the same energy from fossil fuels would have required more than 7,300,000 barrels of oil or over 1,800,000 tons of coal."

Viewed on the average household basis (500 kilowatt-hours monthly usage) the estimated savings per residential consumer amounted to about \$9 for the year, he pointed out.

Perkins explained the 610,000-kilowatt facility in the Town of Scriba was on line 347 days out of 365 days during the year, "a service factor of 95 per cent for boiling water reactors such as that operating at Nine Mile Point, highest in the world."

"In addition," Perkins continued, "the unit achieved an 86 percent thermal capacity (total energy actually generated, divided by all possible energy the unit could have been produced over a given period), a record for domestic boiling water reactors in 1978."

The 95 percent service factor and 86 percent capacity factor compare very favorably with 1978 averages for U.S. nuclear plants of 77 percent and 65 percent, respectively, and 74 percent and 64 percent worldwide.

"Since the unit first went on line commercially in 1969, it has generated more than 29 billion kilowatt-hours," Perkins pointed out. "Generating the equivalent power from fossil fuels would

have taken more than 12,000,000 tons of coal or 48,000,000 barrels of oil." Kilowatts produced by the utility's many hydroelectric power plants on upstate waterways, combined with energy from Nine Mile Point Nuclear Unit No. 1, help to keep their electric rates lowest. All the large state utilities and also lower than the national average, Perkins added.

Outdoor Adirondacks Featured In Potsdam Museum Program

The next in the series of "Sunday Afternoons in the Museum" will be held on Feb. 25 at 2 p.m. The program, at the Potsdam Museum, will feature William K. Verner, curator of the Adirondack Museum in Blue Mountain Lake.

Verner will talk on "Woods and Waters: Outdoor Life in the Adirondacks," which is the theme of their newest exhibit. The exhibit deals with recreation and uses of the Adirondack outdoors. Hunting, fishing, surveying, camping, hiking, climbing, trapping, and winter sports are represented by historic objects, paintings and photographs. The Gold Medal winning bobble from the 1932 Winter Olympics, "USA I" is included in the display. The highlight of the exhibit is the cabin which belonged to Noah John Rondeau, the Cold River hermit.

Slides will be used to illustrate Verner's talk. There will also be two other slide presentations available for viewing. "These are 'Women in the Woods' and 'An 1880's Summer Vacation' both of which are produced by the Adirondack Museum staff with photographs and objects from their collection.

Refreshments will be served and people will have a chance to talk to Verner. This program is part of a series co-sponsored by the St. Lawrence County Historical Association and Silas Wright House and the Potsdam Public Museum. Funding for these programs is made available by a grant from the New York State Council on the Arts.
