Medicare Deductible Raised To \$160

OGDENSBURG—The Medicare hospital insurance deductible—the cost of covered services in each benefit period not paid by Medicare—has been increased to \$160 for benefit periods beginning in 1979 from the 1978 figure of \$144, according to John G. Joly, social security district manager in Ogdensburg.

The deductible is intended to be roughly equal to the cost of one day of care in a hospital. The increase was necessary, Joly said, because of the continually rising cost of medical care.

The deductible is the only amount a Medicare patient is responsible for during the first 60 days of hospital care in a benefit period for covered services.

The increase in the deductible also affects other 1979 per-day costs under hospital insurance.

From the 61st through the 90th day of hospital care in a benefit period, hospital insurance pays for all covered

services except \$40 a day (up from \$36).

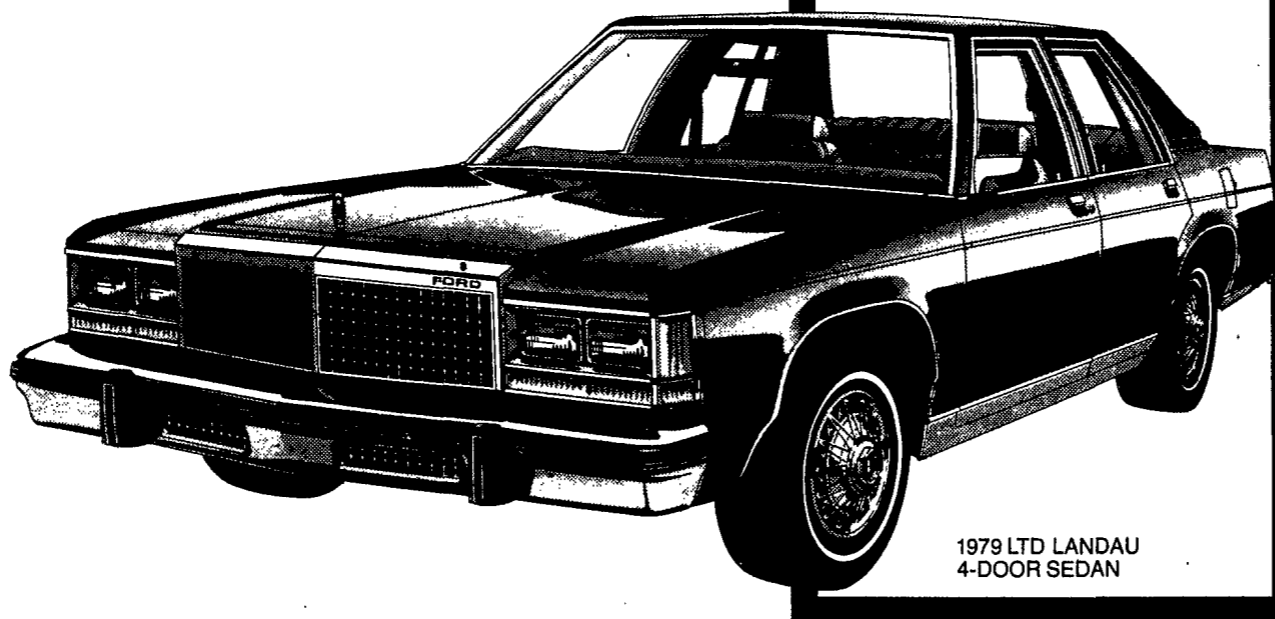

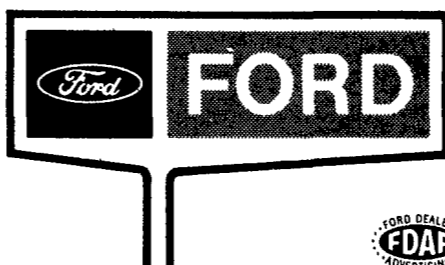
