No Bids; Stockholm Will Keep Buying Agway Fuel

STOCKHOLM—The Town of Stockholm will continue to buy fuel oil from Agway Petroleum Corporation, it has been decided by the Stockholm Town Board. No suppliers bid to provide No. 2 fuel oil at a Jan. 9 meeting.

The board made the decision at their regular meeting held in the Municipal Building, Winthrop, last Tuesday night. Among other action taken by the board was the agreement to pay \$5,000 apiece to the West Stockholm and Winthrop Fire Departments for fire

protection under contract.

James Eagles was present to bring the Town Board up to date on the completion of the arena. The Stockholm Town Board approved that the Recreation Commission would file for a joint reapplication, with the Town of Brasher, for a loan to complete the Recreation Building.

Among other business was: —Highway Superintendent David Jebu was authorized to post the town roads when possible, to purchase stone and

asphalt under state contract, to purchase shoulder dirt at \$1.25 per load and gravel at \$1.50 per load, and to have necessary repairs made to a bulldozer.

Albert Cheney, West Stockholm Recreation Committee; and Garold Newtown, Winthrop Recreation Committee; were both reappointed as members of those respective recreation committees for four year terms.

Miss Virginia Williams, West Stockholm, was reappointed to the BHS Library Board for one year.

Warren Tracy, West Stockholm, was reappointed a member of the Grievance Board for a five year term. The other members of the Grievance Board whose terms do not expire this year are Joseph Wagstaff and William Dubois.

Mrs. Loren (Patricia) Furgison, Winthrop, has been appointed as zoning administrator, and she will also assist with the assessors' bookkeeping. At the January Town Board meeting, it was unanimously agreed to combine the job of zoning administrator and part-time help for the Chairman of the Assessors, David Barnes, at a salary of \$3,500 per hour for the part-time work. The zoning administrator's salary, for the year will be \$650. The out-going zoning administrator was Charles Gibson, Winthrop.

The chairman of the assessors, David Barnes, announced that the final date for new persons eligible to apply for the senior citizens' tax exemption is May 1. To be eligible, persons must be over 65 years of age or over and have an income under \$6,000 per year. The Assessors meet the last Monday night of each month, at 7:30 p.m. at the Municipal Building, Winthrop, to answer questions.

Elizabeth Ramsdell, tax collector, said that she is receiving taxes at the Municipal Building, Winthrop, from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays during the remainder of February; and only on Wednesdays, throughout the months of March, April and May. On all taxes paid after Jan. 31, there is an added interest of one percent for the month of February and an additional half percent for each additional month or fraction thereof thereafter until such taxes are paid or until the return of unpaid taxes to the county treasurer.

John Yandow has been appointed sewer attendant for 1979 at an annual salary of \$1,100.

Proposed Winter Parking Rule Meets Opposition In Norfolk

NORFOLK—A proposed ordinance that would restrict overnight parking on streets in Norfolk and Raymondville during winter months met with opposition at a public hearing conducted by the Norfolk Town Board last Monday night.

Mr. and Mrs. John Greene and Roy Jeffrey said that the proposal could create hardships for their tenants who rent apartments in the business sections, since they said there is no place for the tenants to park cars except in front of the stores.

The proposed local law would restrict parking on any street within the water district limits of the hamlets of Norfolk and Raymondville between the hours of 3 a.m. and 7 a.m. between Nov. 15 and April 15, according to Town Supervisor Edward Ferguson.

The town board delayed action on the proposal in order to allow for further discussion.

On another matter, the Norwood-Norfolk Central School has refused to turn over the property at the Clinton Street Park. In a letter to the town board, School Superintendent Theodore Wodzinski gave the following explanation for the decision: "It would not be the best long term interest of the School District to dispose of the arena property through sale or gift. They would approve a five year lease with option to extend another five years if this could be mutually agreeable."

In other action, the town's property on East High Street will be conveyed to the Town of Norfolk Housing Authority for the construction of senior citizen housing. The conveyance is subject to the following restrictions:

—The Town Housing Authority will clear the site and erect a new water pumphouse at no cost to the township and subject to the approval of the town board.

—The Veterans Memorial will remain in the present area and will not be obstructed from view of East High Street and N.Y.S. Route 56. This area will be kept in respectful appearance at all times by the Town Housing Authority.

—The adjacent property, known as the Vigue property, on the West Side of the town property, to be acquired by the Town of Norfolk Housing Authority, will be sold to the Town of Norfolk at the same price it was acquired for, by the Town Housing Authority, should there be no construction commenced by the Town Housing Authority within five years from the date this property is

acquired by the Town Housing Authority.

The Town of Norfolk Housing Authority will convey the original town property back to the Town of Norfolk, at no cost to the township, within five years of the date of this agreement should there be no construction commenced within this time.

The Norfolk Town Board has the authority to turn the East High Street Park site over to the Norfolk housing project should their application be approved by federal HUD for a Senior Citizens' housing project.

On other matters, the town board voted to petition the New York State Cable Commission to waive the rules pertaining to the application of New Channels Corporation for an amendment to its cable television franchise. A public hearing has been held on the issue and there was no local opposition.

Supervisor Ferguson welcomed Girl Scout Leader Peggy Stafford and four Senior Girl Scouts, and he read a proclamation designating Girl Scout Week in the Town of Norfolk March 11-17. Mrs. Stafford stated that there are 107 regular Girl Scouts and 33 Adult Scouts in the Town of Norfolk.

Joseph Tisdell, of Tisdell Associates, Canton, reported on the Raymondville Sewers.
