Wildcats Clinch Title

After being tripped up by a surprising loss to Norwood-Norfolk, the Wildcats of Gouverneur showed they are still on top by clinching their first division title since the inception of the Northern Conference.

Jim Hatch and Brian Gonyeau combined for 58 points as the Wildcats downed Saranac Lake 88-74 Friday.

The win eased the Wildcats past OFA and Norwood-Norfolk in the league race with the Devils and Flying N's finishing with 13-3 records.

N-N Girls Win

Norwood-Norfolk's girls' basketball team started off their second round of league play with a big win over Salmon River Central 52-30.

The Flying N's were down by seven points at half-time and fought back to take the lead by six points in the fourth quarter. The Salmon River girls did not give up and with only 20 seconds left in the game the score was tied.

Salmon River's press failed, and Kim Myers on a drive with eight seconds remaining in the game passed off to Kathy Donahue, a freshman, who scored the layup with four seconds on the clock.

Salmon River was unable to get a shot and the game ended with Norwood-Norfolk Central in sole possession of second place in the league standings.

At the midway point in the season the team has shown that they can be outstanding. The team broke the school record for the most points scored in the second game of the year when they scored 73 points while holding their opponents to 33. In their seventh game the team scored a school record and a possible league record total of 98 points against a team that they were tied with at that point in the season.

The Norwood-Norfolk girls are outscoring their opponents at the mid-season point at a 66 to 51 point average. The team has already had the best season ever for a girls' basketball team at Norwood-Norfolk.

Last year the team managed only one win and there were times when Coach Stone wondered if they would even score.

"The girls came back and want to play and want to be good," Cindy Justason has just been outstanding this year as a leader and a player. She has 74 rebounds to her credit, and is shooting 45 percent from the field, and 63 percent from the foul line, said Stone.

Cindy still has the tendency to sag off on defense and help everybody and out," he said, "but she is much improved with defense. Ruth Molnar has 99 rebounds to her credit and has been consistently tough on defense at the forward position."

Kim Myers, off to a slow start at the beginning of the season due to an ankle injury scored 21 points against Salmon River and is second for the team in points scored. Kim took the charge twice, Stone said, stole the ball twice and had four assists against Salmon River. "I guess I hate to mention individuals," Stone said, "because so far, we have had real team effort. One of the real outstanding players in the Salmon River game was Kelly Huiatt who didn't score but made a steal in the last two minutes and probably plays tougher defense than anyone else on the team."

"Kathy Donahue got the winning basket but Kim Myers drove and passed off...Ginger Walters, another freshman, is second in the field shot percentage area with 41 percent and 88 points. Taralynn Turner is second in the foul shooting category with 19 points at a 51 percent rate," Stone added.

Elsewhere, Mark Randall poured in 25 points and Mike Regan added 20 as Colton-Pierrepont closed with a 12-4 record to take second place in Division III. C-P nipped Clifton-Fine 71-70.

And, closing out the regular season with a fury while looking ahead to a second, the OFA Blue Devils easily downed Tupper Lake 97-56.

The Blue Devils led the Devils' winning to eight games in Northern Conference action and completed a perfect second round against Division I opponents.

Potsdam Bears Win Again

The red hot Potsdam State Bears won two more State University conference (SUNYAC) games last week and brought the team's record to 7-1 in the conference and 18-4 overall.

The Bears also extended their winning streak to 14 games--the second longest in the school's history.

The 1971-72 team won the last 14 games and the 1972-73 team won the opening six games to reach the now standing record of 20 in a row.

Sophomore Derrick Rowland of Brentwood led the way in scoring by netting 23 points in the 112-68 win over Oswego State and 29 in Saturday's 86-46 victory over Fredonia.

Point guard Ed Jachim continued to set up his teammates with pinpoint passes while Fran Demyan and John Snyder led the team in rebounding--a

vital factor in launching the fast break. Guards Jack Bissetta, Terry Hunter and Pat Donnelly continued to hound the opponents with their cat-like defense.

The Bears are averaging 83.9 points per game while holding opponents to 63.9 for a scoring differential of 20 points per game.

This week Potsdam faces the toughest part of the schedule traveling to Plattsburgh tonight, Tuesday, and then visiting Albany State Friday and Union Saturday.

Plattsburgh is currently in first place in the conference with a 5-0 record while Albany is tied with Potsdam for second with a 7-1 record.

The Bears must defeat both Plattsburgh and Albany to be in position to capture their third straight SUNYAC championships.
