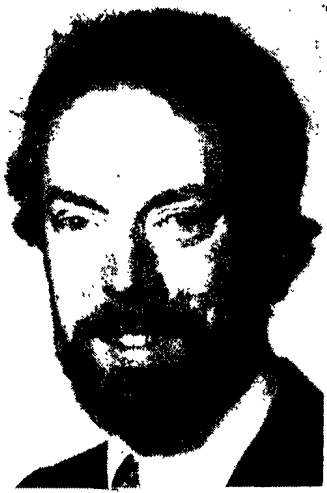
Rolfe Opens Law Office

DOT, Others, Add Support To Air North's Status Bid

In a move to help secure and improve scheduled air transportation service for upstate New York and Vermont communities, the New York State Department of Transportation—together with its Vermont counterpart and five municipalities—has strongly endorsed Air North's bid to obtain a certificate authorizing it to provide scheduled service between several northern communities and Albany, Syracuse, and Burlington.

A statement of position, sent Thursday to the Civil Aeronautics Board in Washington, was signed by the heads of NYSDOT and Vermont's Agency of Transportation, executives of Massena, Ogdensburg, Plattsburgh, and Watertown and the Saranac Lake-Lake Placid airport manager.

Air North has been providing commuter-type service to these communities for a number of years under contract to Allegheny Airlines, the certificated carrier which has held operation rights. On Dec. 9, 1978,

Allegheny gave the required 90-day notice of its intention to suspend service and Air North promptly filed with the CAB for authority to continue serving in its own right the communities it had been serving under contract.

The statement of position by the states and communities served, urges the CAB to act favorably on Air North's petition for air carrier certification. They noted that certification assures that consumers will be protected by CAB regulations and that Air North can best preserve continuity of service.

The statement also fully supported Air North's request for federal subsidy and its proposal to purchase larger aircraft and other facilities in order to serve north country air travelers more efficiently.

Last week the CAB extended until April 6 the date of Allegheny's termination of the North Country service. It has been paying Air North to perform.
