Local Man Would Change Government

 Along this line, he is seeking to form a "Sovereign Individuals Alliance."
 Its goals are stated below:

A better quality of life is obtained when human beings can grow and develop naturally as individuals, according to new philosophical orientation of Natural Individualism.
 The great majority of the individuals are perfectly capable of managing their own affairs and of making their own decisions on all pertinent issues.
 Every individual is entitled to be sovereign, and acts as a sovereign by refusing to delegate any power to any organized group or to any political or bureaucratic representatives, whether elected or appointed.
 The sovereign individuals elective democracy because it is not only unnecessary, but also offensive to the dignity of the individual, as well as exploitative, and likely to encourage corruption, with constant wastes, mismanagements and thefts of taxpayers' money.

The sovereign individuals recognize participatory democracy as the only legitimate form of government, where all the individuals decide and vote directly on the issues by referendum. This system preserves the freedom, dignity and sovereignty of every individual, and assures political and social integrity.
 Every sovereign individual has the right to propose any laws and ordinances without the need to file a petition requiring a prescribed number of signatures from other people. All laws and ordinances become effective only after approval by the majority of the individuals in a referendum.
 The sovereign individuals have the power to appoint by referendum public servants for the administration of ordinary affairs and for the administration of justice at the village, town, county, state and federal levels, as well as within any public institution.

Public servants are not to campaign for their appointment. They are simply to present their credentials, which are publicized by the media, and on which all sovereign individuals vote in a referendum.
 An Administrative Grand Jury is selected at appropriate intervals at random from the voters' rolls within each administrative level to supervise the process of appointment of public servants by referendum, and to supervise their performance during their tenure, until expiration of their fixed terms, or until termination of their appointment by referendum, if it becomes necessary. The Administrative Grand Jury is also to supervise the publication of the individuals' proposals regarding laws and ordinances, and their submission to a referendum at appropriate intervals. Every sovereign individual always maintains the right of intervention, inspection and direct

supervision regarding all public matters, with the exception of matters pertaining to national security.

The Sovereign Individuals Alliance does not admit the existence of any differences among individuals, and as a consequence, is committed to the defense of the complete equality of all sovereign individuals in the world regardless of sex, race, creed or national origin. Each individual has the right to the freedom, dignity and power of a sovereign, and each is committed not to interfere with the freedom, dignity and power of the other individual sovereigns. The sovereign individuals are actively fighting for the liberation of all individuals who are presently oppressed and exploited by elective democracies and totalitarian regimes all over the world, and are actively helping dissidents everywhere.

The sovereign individuals are committed to the preservation of themselves and the environment in their natural state, even if this may result in a slower material progress. Living according to nature is believed to be more important than a frantic industrial development. To this effect constant care is exercised to protect the individual and the environment against possible mutations from foods or other substances, by active consumer protection measures. Consumer protection measures are also to be taken against possible business or industrial exploitations of the sovereign individuals.

The sovereign individuals are committed to change the current political systems to participatory democracy by peaceful means, observing all existing laws until they can be approved or revised by a referendum of all sovereign individuals. To produce this change to participatory democracy, the sovereign individuals take active participation in current events and issues, register to vote in the location where they live most

of the time and vote according to their individual conscience at each opportunity. In particular, the sovereign individuals immediately proceed, starting at the local level, to introduce petitions, with the required number of signatures, asking for a referendum to change the form of government to participatory democracy.

The Sovereign Individuals Alliance is intended to be an informal alliance of sovereign individuals all over the world. To this effect it does not want to be a formal group and does not want to have any formal leaders, officers or representatives. In particular it does not have any treasury, since it does not want to institute payments of dues or to accept any monetary contributions of any kind. Whenever expenses are incurred in the course of any action, they are simply shared informally by the sovereign individuals on a "pay as you go" basis. To readily recognize their participation in the Sovereign Individuals Alliance, individuals may adopt the symbol of a golden sun as the representation of each individual's sovereignty all over the world. Under the same sun, all over the world, each individual human being can finally gain one's total emancipation, and each become, with freedom, dignity and integrity, an individual sovereign.
