## Firemen Respond At Oil Spill

Potsdam firemen stood by for about three hours at the scene of an oil spill that occurred about 3:45 a.m. Friday at an Augsburg fuel oil storage facility on Route 11B.

Augsbury spokesman Joseph Denny said that between 100 and 150 gallons of No. 2 fuel oil were spilled when a storage tank was overfilled because a gauge apparently failed to operate. Fire department estimates placed the spillage at between 200 and 300 gallons.

## Three Hammond Farmers Face Prosecution Over Income Taxes

Three dairy farmers from Hammond have been charged with violations of federal tax laws. They will be arraigned March 12 on the charges in Syracuse.

George H. Lowe, U.S. Attorney for the Northern Judicial District of New York, announced Thursday that a federal grand jury at Utica returned two five-count indictments charging Edwin C. Hadlock, 48, and his brother, William F. Hadlock, 39, both of Hammond, with personal income tax evasion for the years 1972-76.

A criminal information was filed against a third brother, John R. Hadlock, 34, Hammond, charging him with failure to file tax returns for the years 1972-76.

The three men are dairy farmers operating Hadlock's Lockland Farm in Hammond.

Edwin Hadlock is charged with failing to report a total of \$52,344 in taxable income and failing to pay income taxes of \$11,198 for the five years involved.

William Hadlock is charged with failing to report a total of \$61,106 in taxable income and failing to pay income taxes of \$13,410 for the five year period.

John Hadlock is charged with failure to file tax returns for the five years, when he had a total gross income of \$101,831.
