Bill MacKentley Presents Program On Tree Varieties

CANTON—The St. Lawrence County Historical Association and the Potsdam Public Museum have announced that William MacKentley will present a program on the topic "Nut Trees of the North Country" at the Silas Wright House and Museum, Sunday, Jan. 27, at 3 p.m.

MacKentley, a native of Mt. Arab in the extreme eastern section of St. Lawrence County, is the owner of St. Lawrence Nurseries of Potsdam. A biology graduate of SUNY, Binghamton, he taught in southern New York State before returning to St. Lawrence County where he became associated with Fred Ashworth.

He worked with Ashworth for five years before Ashworth's death, after which MacKentley continued the operation. He now searches for new or promising plant varieties, and experiments with their propagation. Successful varieties are sent throughout the country to growers in similar climates.

The lecture on nut trees at the Wright House and Museum, 3 East Main, Canton, is one in the Sunday Afternoon Lecture Series. The public is invited and refreshments will be served.

Volunteerism Is Chamber's Topic

CANTON—The St. Lawrence County Chamber of Commerce is holding its monthly membership meeting on Jan. 24, at noon, at the St. Lawrence Inn, Canton. This is the first meeting of the new year and all members should make an effort to attend. Anyone interested in joining the County Chamber is also welcome.

The featured speaker will be Mrs. Maureen Traynor, coordinator of Volunteer Services at the St. Lawrence Psychiatric Center in Ogdensburg. Mrs. Traynor is in charge of the program to promote volunteer interest and involvement in the center's rehabilitation efforts. During recent years a trend in

hospital care has developed which attempts to keep a patient's life as normal as possible through shorter hospitalization stays, home care if possible, and treatment locally. The idea is no longer to set patients aside but to promote community acceptance. Some organizations give financial support to these recovery programs; in other cases, individual volunteers work in almost every area from therapy to rehabilitation.

Juggling, Ballet Offered At Potsdam

State University College at Potsdam is offering two non-credit courses for Spring 1980.

"Juggling Night" is held Wednesdays, from 7 to 9 p.m. for six sessions. The course is designed to teach the ancient art of juggling.

Participants of all ages will be involved in stretching exercises, relaxation work and balance techniques. Music, both live and recorded, will accompany practice each class period. Three- and four-ball juggling and pin throwing will all be taught by Tim Welch.

Welch is a graduate of Potsdam College and has been extensively involved in the study of dance locally and in San Francisco. He currently teaches Modern Dance and Juggling at the St. Lawrence University Upward Bound Program.

"Ballet for Children" is designed to familiarize children from 8 to 10 years old with basic ballet techniques.

Each class will begin with a classical ballet barre and will include combinations of steps executed across the floor. The class will help students gain strength, flexibility, coordination, rhythm, and a better understanding of ballet as an art form. The course runs from 10:15-11:15 a.m. for ten weeks.

Sylvia Blaustein, the instructor, teaches dance for Potsdam College's undergraduates and also is actively involved in teaching Modern Dance and Ballet for adults in the non-credit program.
