

Norfolk Board Urges Repeal Of Fuel Sales Tax; Signs For Dog Shelter Services

NORFOLK—Like the Potsdam Town Board, the Norfolk Town Board is also urging the St. Lawrence County Board of Legislators to repeal the sales tax on home heating fuels.

The Norfolk board, at its meeting last Monday, passed the following resolution: "Whereas the Norfolk Town Board feels that the current sales tax on heating fuels is grossly inequitable, heating fuels being a necessity in this North Country, we respectfully request that the St. Lawrence County Board of Legislators repeal this tax no later than January of 1981."

The Potsdam Town Board passed a similar resolution at its December meeting. Potsdam's lawmakers urged the county legislature to repeal the sales tax by Oct. 1 of this year.

During budget deliberations this fall, the county legislature weighed the idea of lifting the sales tax. But in a vote that was split along party lines, the county lawmakers decided to keep the tax in place. Critics had stated that the lost revenue could be between \$900,000 and \$1.2 million and that could have ended up being taken out of increased property taxes.

Among other business before the Norfolk board, energy savings renovations to the town hall were discussed and a contract was approved for use of the Potsdam Humane Society's animal shelter.

Energy Savings
The board will advertise for bids for the replacement of windows in the town

hall, renovations and repair to the town hall, and an elevator to provide access for the handicapped to the town hall. Town Supervisor Edward Ferguson was authorized to handle the projects. The lighting systems at the town hall and Raymondville Community Hall have been changed to help conserve energy.

Dog Laws
In compliance with the new state regulations on dogs, the board agreed to a two-month trial contract with the Potsdam Humane Society for dog shelter services. The board agreed to pay the society \$5 per dog per day for animal services.

Under new state regulations, towns that license dogs must also provide shelter services and a dog warden. Norfolk's dog warden is Bernard O'Leary, who was also reappointed at the January meeting.

Previously, the board had turned down a proposal from the Potsdam Humane Society for shelter services at \$5,000 a year. The town councilmen said the price was too high.

Other Business
Town business that came before the town board at the combined audit and organizational meeting included the following:

A report was received from Lt. James Ryan, Commander of the Canton Zone of the N.Y. State Police. He stated that there is a possibility of a satellite trooper station for the Town of Norfolk, which would include 16-hour coverage at

all times, and the 11 p.m. to 7 a.m. shift by the Massena-based State Police. A meeting will be set up in January on this matter.

There is a six-month's extension for CETA funds for Norfolk police officer Richard Williams until Aug. 30. His report for the month of December is: complaints, 25; arrests, 35; and mileage, 2,625 miles.

The town board approved spending the sum of \$450 from the Town of Norfolk for the Drug Council for a one year period. Councilman Robert Bailey explained this new project in which other towns are participating.

In regard to the proposed resolution that all dogs within the township be leashed for the safety and protection of deer, County Legislator Donald Bixby explained that this is not necessary, because when the St. Lawrence County Board of Supervisors believes it is necessary it will be done countywide by the chairman of the board of legislators.

The Norfolk Humane Library requested that there be a possibility of having the library trustees appointed instead of being elected. The town board will check the legal procedures and will report on this request at the Feb. 11 town board meeting.

County Sheriff Keith Knowlton sent a letter explaining problems with their low frequency radios which can not reach throughout St. Lawrence County. The Sheriff's Dept. has requested a change to a high band radio system.

Town officials were authorized to attend the Association of Towns at the New York Hilton Hotel.

There was a letter from the CB Club, thanking the town for the use of the Norfolk arena this past summer. Also, a letter was read from the Norwood-Norfolk Central School, thanking the town for the use of the arena for skating during the month of January.

The fee for the custodian of voting machines has been raised to \$100 per year. Melba Lecuyer presented a petition of 13 names for an extension of cable TV on the Knapps Station Road.

A plaque honoring persons who have served the town for 15 years or more has been received. The names of the following dedicated persons were engraved: Edward Blanchard, Ralph Daggett, Samuel Grant, Leon Eurtro and Margaret Haggert. Supervisor Edward Ferguson presented the plaque at this meeting. It will be placed in the town clerk's office for the public to view. The inscription reads: "This plaque is dedicated in sincere appreciation to employees and elected officials of the Town of Norfolk who have given 15 years or more of faithful service."

Other town board meetings coming up are: at the Norfolk Hepburn Library, at 7 p.m., Jan. 22, with the library; Drug Council, at 7:30 p.m., Jan. 24 at the Lincoln School, Massena; and with the

St. Lawrence Gas Co., at 6:30 p.m., Jan. 31 at Waddington.

Town Clerk and Tax Collector, Arlene Francis, is now receiving taxes at her office at the Norfolk Town Hall, from 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. Monday through Friday, and during the month of January, on Saturdays from 9 a.m. until noon. Taxes may be paid without charge of interest on or before Jan. 31.

Keith Gonyou presented plans for buildings in the sanitary landfill regarding saving money for the town and asked the town board to look over his submitted figures.

The next regular meeting of the Norfolk Town Board will be held at 7 p.m. Feb. 11 at the Norfolk Town Hall.

Appointments and approval of salaries as compiled in the town budget for 1980 were made.

The regular monthly meetings of the Norfolk Town Board are held the second Monday of each month at 7 p.m. in the Norfolk Town Hall. The First National Bank of Norfolk was designated as depository of town funds. The Massena Observer was designated as the official newspaper.

It was authorized that the town officers will be allowed mileage while on town business, at 20 cents per mile. It was 17 cents per mile for 1979.

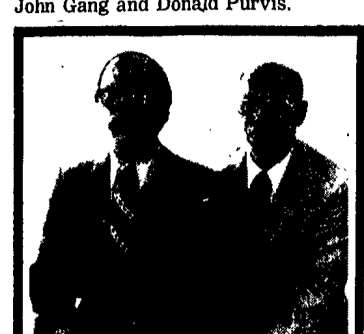

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Norfolk Bank Elects Directors

NORFOLK — The annual stockholders' meeting of the First National Bank of Norfolk was held Jan. 8, 1980 at the banking house.

Directors re-elected at the meeting were Louis J. Honer, Francis W. Lavigne, Harold G. Buck, Byron J. Short, Charles Crabb and Russell B. Strait.

President Louis Honer reported the earnings of the bank continued to increase favorably during the year of 1979. The stockholders received a 100 percent stock dividend in May 1979 and a cash dividend totaling \$13 per share for 1979. The remaining earnings were added to capital funds and reserve for bad debts, making capital funds total \$932,523.12 and reserve for bad debts total \$71,601.46.

Executive vice-president and cashier, Byron Short, in his annual report to the stockholders stated that the assets had increased to \$11,245,448.10, an all time record. Customer deposits were \$1,996,401.23 higher on Dec. 31, 1979 than at the end of the previous year. Interest paid to depositors in the savings department was a record \$441,579.32. Heavy demand for new loans and real estate mortgages to meet the needs of our area customers resulted in an increase in loans of \$1,278,248.45 on Dec. 31, 1979 to a total of \$7,867,055.76. These

figures also represent another high in 63 years of continual service to our community.
