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Fuel Aid Guidelines Listed

CANTON — Help in paying heating bills will be made available by the St. Lawrence County Department of Social Services for households whose income is between 125 and 200 percent of federal poverty guidelines, Social Services Commissioner Donald E. Kitchin announced Tuesday.

The program, called the State Fuel Crisis Assistance Program (SFCAP), is now underway, Commissioner Kitchin said.

The program, administered by local services districts throughout the state under regulations established by the State Social Services Department, will make \$253,632 available in St. Lawrence County. The statewide SFCAP appropriation was set at \$22.5 million by the State Legislature, which passed the legislation creating the program over Gov. Carey's veto late last year.

As defined by the Legislature, the program will provide up to \$200 in the form of a payment, made directly to a fuel-for-heating supplier for households that meet the following criteria:

- 1) Income must be within state-defined limits, and available cash, such as bank accounts, can not exceed \$1,500 for individual or \$2,250 for a family of two or more.
- 2) The households must pay for fuel separately, not as part of rent payments.
- 3) The fuel supplier must have threatened to cut off service or stop

deliveries.

Persons between 125 and 150 percent of poverty are eligible for up to \$200 in aid; \$150 is available to households between 150 and 175 percent; and households between 175 and 200 percent of poverty may receive up to \$100 in aid, but no household may get more assistance than is required to alleviate a fuel emergency.

Households will be served on a first-come, first-served basis, Commissioner Kitchin said, within the limits of the county's \$253,632 allocation. When the allocation is exhausted the program closes, the commissioner cautioned.

Commissioner Kitchin also announced that the St. Lawrence County Social Services Department has a phone number for use by persons who's health or safety is endangered by a fuel emergency during hours when the Department of Social Services is closed. The commissioner said the number, 379-2222, which is the Sheriff's office, is to be used only by those persons who have run out of fuel or are in imminent danger of doing so and have no immediate means of obtaining fuel. This number can be used for such emergencies only between the hours of 5 p.m. and 9 a.m. and on weekends.

For information on fuel programs, do not use the emergency number. Instead, call the Social Services Department at 379-2160 or the State Fuel Assistance Hotline at (800) 342-3820.
