Stockholm Historian's Report Names Historical Center As Highlight

Editor's Note: Mildred Jenkins, Stockholm Historian, has submitted her annual report to the Stockholm Town Board. Portions of her report are quoted here:

"This has been my sixth year as Town of Stockholm Historian.

"I attended the annual workshop meeting for New York State Historians in New York City in February; and the Paul Smith's College Spring Workshop for North Country Historians.

"At last, the goal of forming a History Center for the Town of Stockholm has been realized. The Stockholm Town Board designed a sum of \$250 from Revenue Sharing Funds as a start for this project. Our first meeting, arranged by myself and the Town of Stockholm Historical Committee, was held April 19, 1979, for an informal discussion for ideas and suggestions of starting the renovation of a part of the gymnasium, located at the rear of the Stockholm Municipal Building, Winthrop, to be used for this purpose. Much interest was shown. It has been very gratifying that persons have shown so much interest. We held election of officers of the SHO.

Floor plans were drawn up, and there have been, and still are, several work bees for this renovation for our Historical Center, so that materials and articles of our historical past may be preserved.

"Our SHO, of which Carlton Stickney, is president, sponsored an exhibit of the preview of the opening of the Stockholm Historical Center. It was like stepping into the past and reliving the days and ways of living in yester-years.

"Christmas Memories" was the theme of our SHO Christmas display which was held at the Municipal Building on Dec. 8, with items loaned for the day.

"We have received many donations of items to be used when our history center is completed, and we also have an appointed Genealogy committee.
