

## Again In Monday Night Roundball C-P Girls Blast Knox, Flyers Win

Knox Memorial saw a continuation of their first year woes in Monday night girls basketball competition as Colton-Pierrepont got back on the winning track with an 81-17 pummeling of the Golden Eagles. Norwood-Norfolk was the other local squad to come away victorious, dropping Salmon River 47-41 in a key Division II match-up. Elsewhere St. Lawrence Central and the Potsdam Sandstones were tagged for losses number two and three respectively, the Larries falling 72-57 against Tupper Lake, and the Stoners going down 35-24 against unbeaten Gouverneur.

Carole White scored 15 points with 12 rebounds and sister Tracy added 14 as the Colts throttled the Eagles in Division III action. Beth Wolf also scored 14 for the 2-2 Colts, who face front-running Chateaugay on Thursday night.

Ruth Molnar scored 15 points and came away with 18 rebounds to pace the Flyers to their fourth consecutive win. Ginger Walters layed in 12 additional points for the current Second Division

leaders. Not even a 30-point performance from S.L.C. standout Holly Hazell could lift the Larries past the Tupper Lake five, with Carolyn Collins also contributing 16. S.L.C. will be hoping to end a two game losing streak when they host Madrid-Waddington on Wednesday and Salmon River on Thursday in a pair of Division II encounters.

Ellen Hansen's 11 points were the high total for Potsdam as the Stoners went down to their third defeat against two wins in Division I play. This Thursday the girls travel to Massena in hopes of evening their record at the expense of the Red Raiders.

**Thursday Night Action**

Carmen Aldous dropped 15 and Lori Childon 14 to pace the Demons in their win over C-P. Becky Thomas was the Colts leading scorer with 10. Lisa Lawrence's 20 points led all scorers in Harrisville's victory over Parishville-Hopkinton.

## Bears Take Trio Of SUNYAC Tests, Now 16-0 On Season

The unbeaten Bears of Potsdam State continued their winning ways by sweeping a trio of SUNYAC conference games by scores of 59-48 over Plattsburgh, 62-55 over Cortland and 53-52 over Binghamton.

Plattsburgh, coming into the game with one loss in the conference and coming off a 73-53 rout of Oneonta, gave the Bears more than they bargained for as they stayed with Potsdam for 34 minutes before succumbing to the Bears. Derrick Rowland led all Potsdam scorers with 13 points and eight rebounds, with Bill Perkowski and Mitchell each adding 10 apiece. Plattsburgh's Kevin Baldwin took game honors with 28 points.

Potsdam started their spread offense against Cortland and jumped to an 8-0 lead after seven minutes on hoops by Maurice Woods and Derrick Rowland and a pair of foul shots by Rowland. Cortland eventually caught up with the Bears when they ran off eight straight to make the score 17-16. Potsdam with six minutes left in the half. The Bears fell behind 29-27 at halftime when Cortland outscored Potsdam 9-2. Wayne Rhodes canned two long jumpers in the last 20 seconds to keep the Bears within striking range.

The maroon and white opened the second half with eight straight points against Cortland's man to men defense, but once again failed to put them away. The Bears did manage to hold a five point lead most of the half until Scott Franko picked up his fourth and fifth personal fouls. This allowed Cortland to tie the game at 48 and 50.

Rowland converted a layup and a pair

of foul shots and Woods added two as Potsdam started an eight point streak to put the game away. Cortland lost its third league game to put the Dragons out of contention for the SUNYAC league championship tournament.

The Binghamton game was as close as the final score of 53-52 indicates. Neither team was able to gain more than a five point lead in the first half as the teams played to a 32-32 halftime tie.

Potsdam gained control of the game in the second half as they managed to hold on to their five point lead most of the period. Derrick Rowland gave the Bears their biggest lead of the game at 53-46 with just over a minute to play by hitting both ends of a one and one.

The game seemed clinched, but Binghamton didn't seem to agree, as they closed to within one point with 18 seconds left. After a Potsdam timeout, the Bears came out and promptly turned the ball over on the inbounds pass with 15 seconds left.

Binghamton forced up two bad shots and Potsdam gained control. The Bears inbounded the ball and held control for 10 seconds until Rowland was intentionally fouled with two seconds left. He missed the front of the one and one but blocked the outlet pass and the Bears had their 16th straight win.

Following a Wednesday night battle against rival St. Lawrence University, the Bears will play host to Cortland State this Friday in an 8 p.m. start. This will be the final meeting between the two schools this season and is a SUNYAC conference game.

On Feb. 2, Potsdam visits crosstown rival Clarkson in their annual Ice Carnival matchup. Gametime is 3 p.m.

Gouverneur made a major contribution to Potsdam's 0-8 wrestling woes with a 60-6 pummeling in Friday night NAC action.

The loss was the third against five victories for the Red Raider grapplers, with Massena currently holding down second place in

the Division I standings.

Six straight pins by Hermon-Dekalb gave the Demons all the points they needed to dump the Stoners in Wednesday night's battle between last place teams. Tom Bryant, Bernie Hayes, and Kim Marlow scored falls at 136, 155, and 177 for Potsdam while Dan Ames picking up a 7-6 decision in the 132 pound ring. Against Gouverneur on Friday nine Sandstone wrestlers finished bouts on their backs and the Wildcats received a forfeit to pave the lopsided victory, their ninth without defeat in the current NAC campaign. Bernie Hayes scored Potsdam's only points with a pin at 155.

Potsdam will be at Malone on Wednesday with OFA scheduled to invade the Stoner mats Friday night in regular season action. Following a Monday night match at OFA the Jackets are idle until Saturday when they will face Hermon-Dekalb in a Division II match-up.
