### Papal Delegate To Make Stop In Ogdensburg

It has been confirmed that His Excellency, the Most Reverend Jean Jadot D.D., Apostolic Delegate to the United States, will visit the Diocese of Ogdensburg on Feb. 10 and 11.

This is the first visit of the Archbishop to the Diocese since he was named Apostolic Delegate by Pope Paul VI in 1973.

Archbishop Jadot is scheduled to celebrate the noon Mass Feb. 10, 1980 at St. Mary's Cathedral in Ogdensburg. He will preach at this Liturgy.

Priests are invited to concelebrate and the Mass is open to the public. Music for the ceremony will be provided by the Cathedral and Notre Dame choirs of Ogdensburg under the direction of Father Paul E. Whitmore, Cathedral organist. Following the Mass a reception will be held for the public in the Cathedral meeting rooms.

On Feb. 11, at 9 p.m. the Archbishop, along with a number of major church leaders, is to take part in the large "Ecumenical Festival of Celebration" to be held at the Olympic Center in Lake Placid. The Religious Affairs Committee of the 1980 Winter Olympics has planned this service prior to the start of the games.

Pastoral Delegate Observers of the Catholic scene in the United States have seen in Archbishop Jadot one of the most pastoral delegates named by recent popes. Nominations for new bishops are made to Rome by the national hierarchy, but it is reported that the Vatican always consults with its delegate in each country before naming bishops and requests that he make

extensive inquiries about the candidates.

In an interview with The Washington Post shortly after arriving in this country the delegate said that it is "the policy of the Holy See to look for bishops who have a very wide and strong pastoral experience." Since his arrival in the United States 126 new bishops have been named or transferred and many of them very young men.

The Apostolic Delegate meets with the American bishops each year and addresses them on topics of particular concern to their work in this country. He has visited every state and nearly every diocese. He has met with each president since his arrival, including Presidents, Nixon, Ford and Carter.

Archbishop Jadot was born in Brussels, Belgium, Nov. 23, 1909. He served as an Assistant pastor for five

years and was National Chaplain to several Catholic student groups and to the Military forces in the Congo. Later he headed the National Mission Office of the Propagation of the Faith.

In 1968, he was named an archbishop and began his Vatican diplomatic career. He served as Apostolic Delegate for Laos, Malaysia and Singapore, in addition to holding the additional post of Pro-Nuncio in Thailand. From 1971 until he came to the United States he was Pro-Nuncio Apostolic in Cameroon and Gabon, and Apostolic Delegate for Equatorial Guinea.

Archbishop Jadot succeeded Cardinal Luigi Raimondi as Apostolic Delegate to the United States. He is the first non-Italian to serve as the Pope's U.S. Representative and has traveled in this country more widely than previous apostolic delegates.
