have been prepared by the Internal Revenue Service for use by everyone. The tapes may be checked out just like books and used at home. They contain step-by-step guidelines for the preparation of Federal Tax Forms 1040 and 1040A, as well as instructions for completing Schedules A and B, which are the two most commonly used with the 1040. Taxpayers report itemized deductions and income from interest and dividends on these schedules. Taxpayers using these cassette tapes with their tax forms instructions, should be able to prepare their returns quickly and completely.

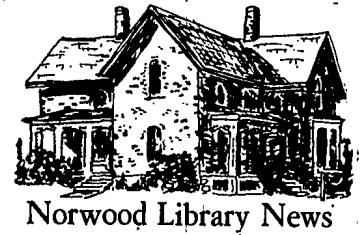
## \$2,000 Grant For SLU's Summer Theater

CANTON — Through the offices of the New York State Council on the Arts' 1979-80 North Country Regional Decentralization Pilot Program, the departments of fine arts and theatre arts at St. Lawrence University have received a total of \$2,300 in state funds to support programs designed to enrich the cultural life of St. Lawrence County and adjacent areas.  
The sum of \$900 has been allocated to the Richard F. Brush Art Gallery to help fund St. Lawrence University's first North Country Women Artists Exhibition to be held May 4-24.  
Organized in cooperation with the Laurentian Women's Association, this

juried exhibition has been designed to recognize the particular talent and vision of North Country women artists. One or more of the works included in the exhibition will be considered for purchase for the University's permanent collection.

The remaining \$2,000 will be used by the University's summer repertory theatre. Funds will be distributed in the form of scholarships—eight for actors and four for technical support. Although

the plays have not yet been selected, the SLU summer repertory theatre will tour two shows throughout the North Country.  
The theatre company, to be chosen through open auditions in April, will be made up primarily of talent from the four member colleges of the Associated Colleges of the St. Lawrence Valley and residents of the community who are willing to participate in an intensive two-month theatrical experience.

### Norwood Library News

The annual meeting of the Norwood Library Association will be held at the library at 7:30 p.m. Feb. 6. All residents, patrons and friends of the library are invited to be present for the election of trustees and the reading of annual reports. An organizational meeting of the board of trustees will be held immediately following the close of the public meeting.

Why libraries? Libraries today are more than mere collections of books. They also offer sewing patterns, magazines and newspapers, a 16mm projector and screen, films, atlases, almanacs, recordings, art prints, cassette tapes, reference services, college catalogs, collections dealing with local history, special programs for children and adults and a trained staff including a professional historian.

Libraries offer data and research on all issues of daily living; there it is possible to receive help in updating and learning new skills; find materials for high school or college requirements and staff development and an external high school diploma, plus special materials for the visually handicapped.  
The classic role of libraries has been to serve the educational and recreational needs of the community. This role continues along with the new ones. Libraries, more and more, are reaching out into the community to all who can use the many services.

The Norwood Library has served this area since 1912 when the first facility was opened over the Norwood Bakery. Since that time a constant program of expansion has been carried out by the dedicated board of trustees and the help of interested citizens.
