

Bruce Laingen Talk Sold Out

Bruce Laingen, former Charge d'Affaires at the United States Embassy in Tehran, Iran, will speak at State University College of Arts and Science, Potsdam Nov. 13.

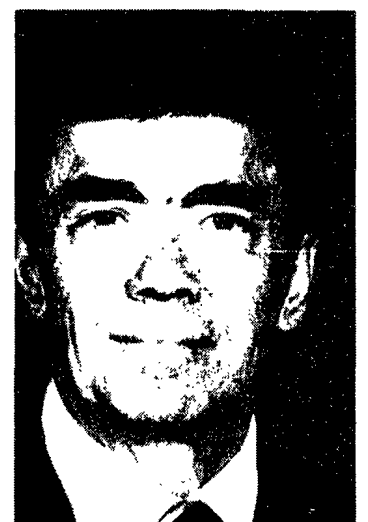
The free lecture has already been sold out.

The 8:15 p.m. lecture in Helen Hosmer Hall on the Potsdam College campus is sponsored by the college's convocation committee with funds provided by the Office of Academic Affairs, the Potsdam Auxiliary and College Educational Services, Inc. (PACES) and the Student Government Association.

Laingen was born in Minnesota. He received his B.A. from St. Olaf College in 1947, and his M.A. from the University of Minnesota in 1949. During 1943-46 he served with the United States Navy.

He entered the Foreign Service in 1949 and was appointed Consular Officer in Hamburg in 1951, a position he held until 1953. During 1953-54 he served as Economic Officer in Tehran, and from September 1954 to February 1955 as Acting Principal Officer at Meshed. Following this, he returned to Tehran, also as Economic Officer, where he remained until 1956. From 1956 to 1960, he served as Deputy, the Officer-in-Charge, of Greek Affairs in the U.S. Department of State.

In 1960 Laingen was assigned to Karachi as Political Officer, and from 1964 to 1967 served as Officer-in-Charge of Pakistan-Afghanistan Affairs in the State Department. He attended the National War College,

after which he was appointed Deputy Chief of Mission to Kabul.

After his return to the State Department in 1971, he served successively as Country Director for Pakistan and Afghanistan (1971-1973), Country Director for India, Nepal, Sri Lanka and the Maldives Islands (June to August 1973), Acting Deputy Assistant Secretary for Near East and South Asian Affairs (1973-1975), and in February 1975 was appointed as Deputy Assistant Secretary for European Affairs, a position he held at the time of his nomination as Ambassador to Malta, where he served from 1977 to 1979.

From June until Nov. 4, 1979, Laingen served as Charge d'Affaires of the Embassy in Tehran. He was among those held hostage in Tehran from that date until his release on Jan. 20, 1981.

Laingen was awarded the State Department's Meritorious Honor Award in 1967 and the Award of Valor in 1981.

Westerling Becomes Hospital's Director Of Relations, Development

Demonstration Will Show New Repair Methods

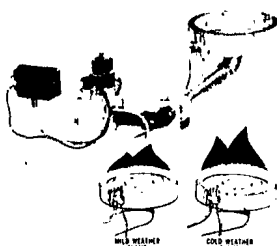
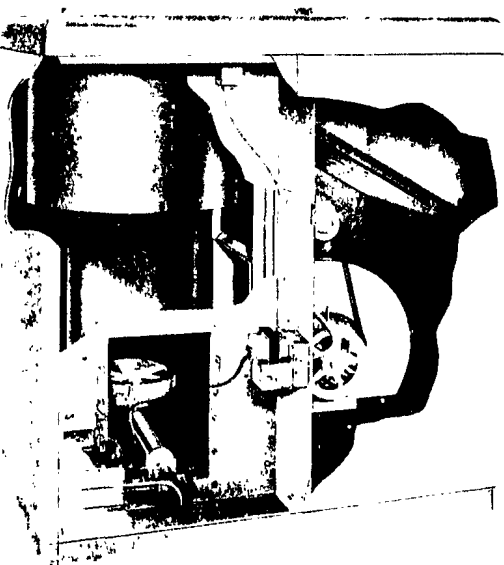
