

## Forbes Joins Exec Club At Clarkson

John Forbes, a recently retired Vice President of the M.W. Kellogg Company, has become the second member of the School of Management's Resident Executive Club at Clarkson College.

The club, now over a month old, will induct at least five other prestigious representatives from the business world who will be coming to Clarkson's campus during the school year.

Forbes fulfilled the club's prerequisite by spending two nights on campus, guest-lecturing at two to three classes on topics related to his field and meeting with selected graduate and undergraduate students in various discussion groups. He also

met with Clarkson administrators and the School of Management staff.

Forbes completed his degree in mechanical engineering in 1941 and then began his career in the heavy machinery industry as a project engineer for the American Cyanamid Company. In 1954 he joined Kellogg as a packaging project engineer in the Central Engineering Division. From 1960 to 1966 he was in production management working as packaging supervisor, assistant plant engineer and assistant manager. He then transferred to the newly formed Corporate Processing Development Department and was made Vice President of Corporate Development in 1970.

Six years later he took on additional duties as Vice President of Technical Development as well as being responsible for technical service to Kellogg Company plants throughout the world. The executive is also a speaker at corporate technical management seminars, and a college instructor in technical management. He has been a lecturer for the American Management Association since 1967 and served as a member of their Research and Development Council for ten years.

"I think the Resident Executive Club is a most unusual opportunity for an exchange of views, both for the executive and the student," Forbes commented.
