### Ministers Honored At Reception

NORFOLK — A reception was held Oct. 18 at the Norfolk United Methodist Church, given by the Norfolk and Raymondville United Methodist Churches, in honor of the new pastor of the two churches, the Rev. Terry Paufler, and her husband, the Rev. Denis Paufler, who is pastor of the Hannawa Falls and Colton United Methodist Churches.

The reception was preceded by a covered dish dinner held at the Norfolk Church.

Welcome was given by Dr. Donald O. Bixby, layman of the Norfolk Church. A mini-album of pictures and newspaper clipping of the day's events was presented to the couple by Mrs. Vi Spotswood.

The couple moved to the United Methodist parsonage, Main Street, Norfolk, from Sycamore, Ill., where the Rev. Therese (known as Terry) Paufler became pastor of the Norfolk and Raymondville United Methodist Churches on July 1, and her husband, the Rev. Denis Paufler became pastor of the Colton and Hannawa Falls United Methodist Churches on July 19.

The Rev. Terry Paufler is the only child of Orville and Florida Moore of Jamesburg, N.J. She resided and worked for awhile in New York City in data processing for an advertising agency, and did part-time study at the City University, New York City, and the University of Buffalo.

She received a B.A. degree from Mundelein College, Chicago, Ill. in religious studies, where she graduated in 1978.

The Rev. Denis Paufler was born in Buffalo, a son of Julia Paufler and the late Fred Paufler. He has two brothers, Frederick of Grand Rapids, Mich. and Roger of Charlotte, N.C. He was raised in the town of Tonawanda and resided in New York City for eight years where he was employed on Wall Street as a clerk and on 5th Avenue as a credit manager at the former Korvette's. For the past eight years, he has been associated with the Wurrizer Corporation as organ service manager.

He has attended several colleges and has a double associate applied science degree in electricity and electronics and an A.S. in industrial education. He also holds a B.A. in educational studies from Northeastern University of Chicago, Ill., and at the present time, he is working on a master of divinity degree from Queen's Theological College, Kingston, Ont., Canada.

He has been a church organist and choir director for the past 25 years. The couple met while he was director of music at her home church in Jamesburg, N.J., and they were united in marriage in Jamesburg, N.J. on June 19, 1971.

Following their marriage, the couple moved to Brooklyn where she worked and attended college at the City University of New York.

She entered the Garrett Evangelical Theological Seminary in Evanston, Ill. in 1978 and graduated in May, 1981. While in seminary, she served as a student associate in the Broadway United Methodist Church in Chicago, Ill.; and served a year's internship as chaplain at the Georgian Senior Citizens Center in Evanston.

The Norfolk and Raymondville United Methodist Churches are her first churches. She comes from a family who has served United Methodist clergy, both active and retired. She is the third generation in the ministry in her father's family. Her activities also include bowling.

She is a full member of the International Order of St. Luke the Physicians, an ecumenical organization which fosters the holistic healing ministry throughout different churches in the area.

The Rev. Denis Paufler's hobbies are electronics and music, and he is an organ repair service technician.
