Students from Norwood-Norfolk High School were selected to be members of the Zone 5 Area All-State NYSSMA Band and Chorus and will be representing Norwood-Norfolk High School at the All-State Festival held at 8 p.m. on Nov. 21 in the Hosmer Crane School of Music, Potsdam. Admissions charge for the festival will be \$1.

Mrs. Gail Vroman Gage, vocal music teacher at Norwood-Norfolk High School, is general chairman of the festival. Mrs. Gage resides on Circle Drive in Potsdam.

Students from Norwood-Norfolk were selected for the All-State NYSSMA Chorus and Band through their competition ratings last spring or auditions this past September. They are all students of Mrs. Gail Gage, Mr. Scott LaVine and Mrs. Roxanne Way.

Thirty schools from St. Lawrence, Jefferson, Lewis, and Oswego Counties will be represented at the All-State Festival.

Joseph Liotta of Potsdam Central School will be chairman of the 200 member chorus at the Festival. The guest conductor will be Mrs. Marcia Giambone, an active NYSSMA adjudicator, conductor and high school music teacher.

Elmer James of Potsdam Central School will be chairman of the 120-member band in the festival. The conductor will be Dr. William Willett, who is Professor of Music at Harth School of Music in Connecticut.

The orchestra chairman will be Agnes McCarthy of Indian River Central School. The 85 member orchestra will be conducted by Calvin Corster Assistant Conductor of the Syracuse Symphony.

Two days of intense rehearsals will be held on November 20 and 21, just prior to the Festival.

The public is encouraged to attend and see the musical talent of our area high school students.

Martin Receives Word From President That Drum's Military Future's Assured

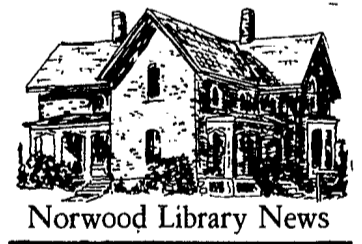
WASHINGTON — Congressman David O'B. Martin has received assurances from President Reagan that there is to be a "key military installation," in the wake of last week's announcement that the Jefferson County army base would soon be utilized as a temporary detention center for several thousand Cuban and Haitian refugees. Martin received these assurances during an Oval Office meeting with the president last week, according to a spokesman in the congressman's office, who noted that several improvements to Fort Drum are actually under consideration by the Reagan administration and will be receiving future review and discussions.

At the Oval Office meeting last week, "President Reagan reiterated his administration's commitment to the enhancement and development of Fort Drum's long-term role as a key military installation," according to Thomas Franjola, Martin's press spokesman.

Listed among the various improvements that are currently being considered for Fort Drum by the Reagan administration are: the possibility of bringing the army base

up to brigade level with 5,000 troops; an expansion of the National Guard and reserve activities; the construction of a maintenance, supply and operations center for the XM1 tank; the construction of a weapons simula-

tion facility; and an increased effort to deploy the 800-troop battalion that is scheduled to be transferred from Korea to Fort Drum. Original plans called for the deployment to be effected by 1983.

The 280-page "Stamps and Stories — The U.S. Postal Service Encyclopedia of U.S. Stamps," priced at \$3.50, contains full-color reproductions of all U.S. stamps. The book, designed to provide interesting philatelic information for both the novice and the experienced stamp collector, includes more than 100 stories about the stamp subjects and designs.

information on price trends of selected stamp issues, catalogue numbers and current prices for souvenir pages and commemorative panels, and an index listing of every U.S. Commemorative stamp ever issued.

The 1981 Mint Set, priced at \$8.25, is the latest in a series of annual sets of commemorative and special stamps released by the Postal Service each year prior to the holiday season. The cover of the colorful set features a montage of artwork related to the stamps inside.

Postmaster Hamilton said that this year the folder features a "gate-fold," a printer's term to describe a four-fold panel, that permits viewing of the entire set while allowing for storage of the stamps in a folder. Acetate strips on the inside provide spaces in which the enclosed stamps may be mounted and displayed.

In addition to these two items, the post office also has several popular topical stamp collecting kits priced at \$3 and \$2.50. Of particular interest to beginning collectors, these kits feature topics ranging from "The

American Revolution" to space and sports. Each kit includes a 20-page album, mounting hinges, insert sheets for additional stamps and a booklet entitled, "The ABC's of Stamp Collecting."

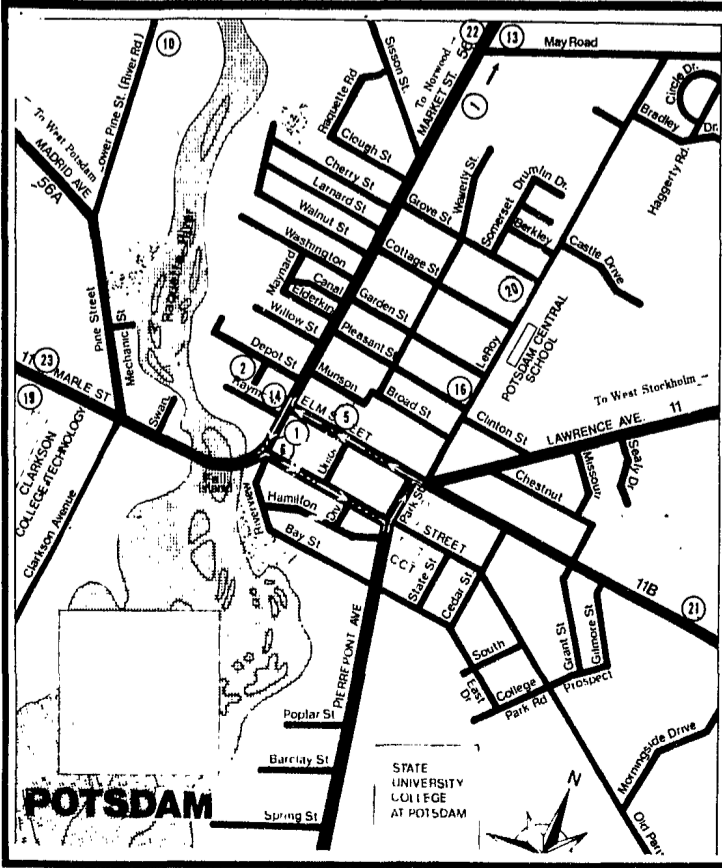

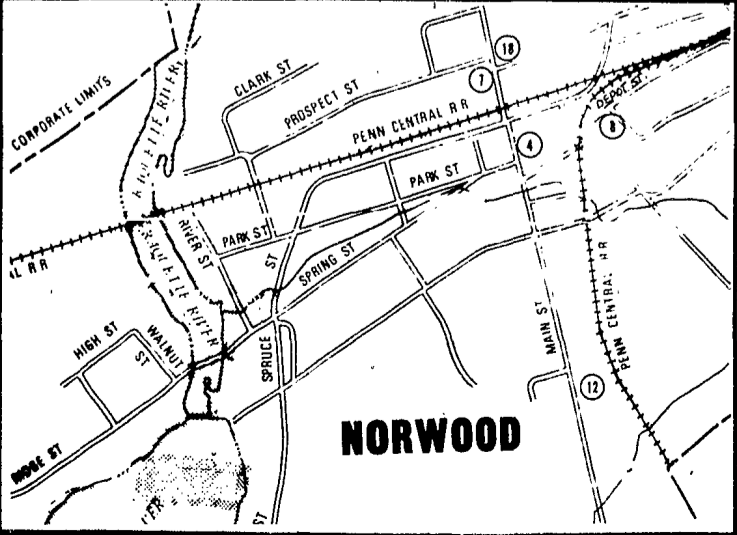
