Speeding Cases Top Docket

Speeding and other motor vehicle related incidents were the order of the day Nov. 19 when Town Justice Theodore Malek presided over a session of Potsdam Town Court.

Potsdam police last week helped the sheriff's department arrest a 27-year-old woman who was wanted in South Carolina for failing to return a rental car she had taken from that state in August, according to authorities.

She was being held there last week awaiting a response from South Carolina authorities, police said.
