IN AND AT A MAXIMUM ESTIMATED COST OF \$2,700,000, AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$2,700,000 SERIAL BONDS OF SAID VILLAGE TO PAY THE COST THEREOF.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Potsdam, St. Lawrence County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The reconstruction of the presently inactive hydroelectric facility located on the Raquette River in and for the Village of Potsdam, St. Lawrence County, New York, including original furnishings, equipment, machinery and apparatus required for the purposes for which such hydroelectric facility will be used, and interest on obligations during the construction thereof, at a maximum estimated cost of \$2,700,000, is hereby authorized.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of such specific object or purpose is \$2,700,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$2,700,000 serial bonds of said Village, hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law; provided, however, that the amount of serial bonds ultimately to be issued shall be reduced by the amount of any grants-in-aid received by such Village for such project from either the United States Department of Energy or the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority. Further details concerning said bonds will be prescribed in a further

Permit May Be Needed For Construction Project

Village Building Inspector Herbert Crump has reminded residents that a permit may be necessary for construction projects in the village.

In a recent press release, Crump noted that the village has a Building Construction Code and a Zoning Code. "It may be that your proposed construction does not meet the standards or requirements of these codes"

Crump stated, adding that residents can avoid delays by planning ahead and "by contacting the building inspector before you begin a project to determine whether or not a special permit is necessary."

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is thirty years, pursuant to subdivision 5 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will exceed five years and that no down payment is required therefor pursuant to Section 107.00(d) (3) (d) of the Local Finance Law.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Village Treasurer, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and content, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Village Treasurer, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 5. The faith and credit of said Village of Potsdam, St. Lawrence County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal and interest on such bonds as the same respectively become due and payable. As annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay

the principal of and interest on such bonds becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said Village, a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same become due and payable.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes may be contested only if:

- 1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said Village is not authorized to expand money, or
- 2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or
- 3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. Upon this resolution taking effect, the same shall be published in full in The Courier-Freeman, the official newspaper, together with a notice of the Village Clerk in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 8. This resolution is adopted subject to permissive referendum in accordance with Section 36.00 of the Local Finance Law and Article 9 of the Village Law.
