County Legal Department Fails To Win Support

CANTON — A proposed consolidation of St. Lawrence County's lawyers under one legal department was cut from the proposed 1983 budget after it failed to generate support among members of the legislature's finance committee.

That means Social Services department lawyer Ethan Phillips will keep his \$28,000 a year job, and County Attorney Charles Palm will continue as a one man part-time law firm for the county, legislators say.

"It didn't get much backing," said finance committee chairman Nicholas Viskovich. "We felt it was too much of a gamble."

Viskovich said that he and other members of the powerful finance committee believed that some cases handled in the Social Service department were too important to leave to an inexperienced new attorney.

"We were being asked to take too big a gamble for an \$8,000 savings," Viskovich said. "We felt we would be

letter off to just leave it as it is." The legislature's legislative and judicial committee and Social Services committee had both supported moving the Social Services attorney under the jurisdiction of County Attorney Palm.

Palm had recommended that the county hire a young assistant county attorney at a lower salary. The attorney would also have been available for other legal work, as well as allowing the county to cut down on the amount outside legal work that is currently contracted out.

The proposal also called for hiring a paralegal to perform research work and to represent the county in administrative fair hearings, officials say.

But county legislature chairman Augustus Marscher said that while the proposal may have suffered a severe setback, it is still too early to just write it off as a dead issue.

"Nothing ever dies," Marscher said.

"It could be brought up from the floor," Marscher said. "I'm not saying it will be. The finance committee considers it dead. But anyone can bring up anything they want."

"Nobody knows how the budget is going to turn out," Marscher said. "It doesn't prohibit anyone from making changes."

"It was approved by two committees and anything can happen in the budget," Marscher said.

But Viskovich said he doubts the proposal has enough support for any legislators to launch an 11th hour drive to gather the 12 votes necessary to restore the department to the budget.

"I doubt it would get much backing," Marscher said. "I don't think there's enough support."

Viskovich said he agrees that the current system of relying heavily on hiring outside attorneys is expensive, but he said he and other legislators have too many questions about the proposed change to support it.

Make Reservations Now For Cabins In State Parks

ALBANY — Now is the time to make reservation applications for vacations in state park cabins next summer, according to the State Parks and Recreation Department.

Reservations for summer cabins in state parks will be accepted Jan. 1 through Jan. 15 for the Jan. 20 cabin lottery drawing. Applications received after Jan. 15 will be drawn in subsequent lotteries.

"Each year, the demand increases for state park cabins," said New York State Parks Commissioner Orin Letman. "With only 73 state park cabins, we hope our lottery will insure equal opportunities for anyone to obtain reservations."

The summer cabin rental season extends from mid-April to mid-October. The state park system has cabins available in the Allegany, Central, Finger Lakes, Genesee, Palisades, Taconic and Thousand Islands regions. Accommodations range from rustic cabins in secluded forest areas to cozy lakeside cottages, occupancy for two to six people and fees ranging

from \$48 to \$128 per week. For a free cabin reservation application listing rental procedures, accommodations and fees write to: Cabins, New York State Parks, Albany, N.Y., 12238.
