Craig Richael Wins 4-H Awards

HOPKINTON — Craig Richael, a 14-year-old 4-H Member from Hopkinton, placed sixth among about 80 other 4-H members in the National Junior Horticulture Association Contest held on Oct. 30 in Niagara Falls. Craig was part of the four-person New York 4-H Team, which placed fifth out of the 20 other state teams.

Craig, who got the highest score of any New York State contestant, has been a member of the "Busy House" 4-H Club of Winthrop for seven years. Much of that time was spent on gardening projects. With his personal experience and various 4-H gardening activities for practice, Craig won highest senior division score in both

county and state fair vegetable judging contests, qualifying him for the national contest. Dietre, Craig's sister, also did very well at both county and state fair vegetable judging contests, tying for first place in the junior division, proving the skills must run in the family.

The national contest itself was only one part of the National Junior Horticulture Association Convention which Craig attended Oct. 29 to Nov. 1. A number of educational tours and activities were also held, including a talk with Dr. David Call, Dean of Cornell's College of Agriculture and Life Sciences.

He has authored over 140 articles for publication and serves as consultant to several journals, publishers and organizations.
