Rishe All-SUNYAC

Bears Skaters Go 1-1

Potsdam College's men's hockey squad took to the road last weekend hoping to establish the tone for the infant 1982-1983 sked by edging Cortland 3-2 on Friday. They bowed to powerhouse Elmira College 5-2 on Saturday in a game which saw the officials actually clear the arena of fans.

The Bears, who now stand at 2-2 for the season, will be on the road again on Wednesday at Oswego before playing host to Brockport this Sunday.

On Friday, a power-play goal by Denis Marcoux, with assists from his brothers, Pierre and Yves, put the Bears ahead to stay late in the first period.

The power-play again proved effective in the second stanza with Randy Fredrick connecting from Mike Pratt and Denis Marcoux at the 5:56 point of the period.

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Less than a minute later the Bears found the mark again when Dan Williams tallied from Brian Bell as Potsdam was staked to a three goal lead.

The Bears and goalie Stephan Lapierre, who had 23 saves, hung on despite giving up two unanswered tallies to make the game close.

Bears Women's B-Ball Begins With Close Win

Potsdam College, relying on a veteran crew this season, opened its women's basketball season with hopes of improving on last winter's 11-12 mark by edging Carleton 49-47 last Thursday in the season opener.

Donna Finley, who led the squad in assists, steals and had a 10.2 points per game average last year, picked up where she left off, scoring 12 points to pace the Bears.

Lawler Shatters All-Time National Scoring Record

Potsdam College's women's hockey squad opened its 1982-1983 season with the hope of national recognition, a record-shattering performance and the appearance of one of the top female hockey players in the nation as the Bears pounded Vermont 10-0 on Sunday.

Potsdam will host Providence College on Friday at 4:30 p.m. The Bears' record-shattering performance was by superstar Kathy Lawler who became college hockey's all-time leading scorer, male or female, with 351 points. Her five goals and one assist against Vermont pushed her past the mark set by Middebury College's Phil Latrell over two decades ago. As a freshman, Lawler notched 119 points and added 163 more in her sophomore season.

Last year she amassed an incredible 93 goals and 123 points. And from Sunday's 5-1 performance, indications are for another outstanding season.

This season, the Bears will also sport Massena native Kim Wood, who was the 1982 Most Valuable Player in the Women's Intercollegiate Hockey Association's All-Star game. Wood who had two goals on Sunday, was one of the top scorers in the nation for Cortland State last year with 44 goals and 20 assists in 15 games.

Theresa LaFarge also notched two goals for the Bears against Vermont, while Elizabeth Bach, Kim Michaud, Monique Stevens, Judy Molnar and Dianne Johnson helped to set up the unstoppable Bears' attack.

Kathy Valade made nine saves to gain the shutout.

Refs Clear Arena Of Fans After Ball Tossed On Ice

In the often violent sport of men's ice hockey, it is not unusual to see referees throw players out of a game. But here's a switch. On Saturday night at Elmira College, they threw the entire crowd out.

Referees Gary Little and Dick Holmberg stopped play in the game between Potsdam College and Elmira with just 7:35 remaining in the final period until the entire arena was cleared of spectators.

Play had been stopped on several occasions earlier in the contest to pick debris off the ice, where it had been thrown by unruly fans. The crowd of nearly 2,000 had been warned repeatedly over the public address system that disciplinary action would be taken against anyone who threw objects onto the playing surface. In addition, a warning was printed in the game program.

The threats apparently were taken lightly. At 12:25 of the third period, a small rubber ball was hurled to the ice and the game was halted. A delay of more than 35 minutes ensued, as the throng reluctantly departed.

Hundreds remained chanting, "Hell no, we won't go!" Season-ticket holders demanding justice angrily waved the now useless passes at school officials.

A small group of spectators ventured into the section of crowd which had produced the projectiles and returned with numerous empty liquor containers.

"Here's your problem," they shouted at security officials and slammed the bottles into a nearby trash bin.

N-N Booters Eliminated

SYRACUSE — Norwood-Norfolk's dream of a New York State soccer championship ended on the slippery turf of Coyne Field in Syracuse on Saturday as the Flyers were upset by Fabius-Pompey, 1-0, in the Class C Central Conference finals.

The Flyers saw their 18-game winning streak snapped despite controlling play for much of the game on the rain-soaked treacherous artificial turf. In addition to the slippery carpet, the Flyers had to contend with a tricky wind which made offensive play difficult.

It was the wind, however, that accounted for the only goal of the match, F-P's Chris Vailletta fired a seemingly innocent bicycle kick from over 35 yards out that sailed in the wind, catching the upper left-hand corner of the net, just over a helpless Bill Campbell.

Campbell, who notched eight saves in the game, played very well, as did his counterpart, Scott Mawson. Mawson, an Onondaga League all-star, thwarted the Flyers repeatedly in the contest.

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
