Calling hours at the Anderson Funeral Home in North Lawrence will be Wednesday and Thursday afternoon and evening.

Mr. White died Tuesday morning (Nov. 23, 1982) at the Massena Memorial Hospital, where he had been a patient since Saturday.

Surviving are his wife, Martha; two daughters, Mrs. Emery (Ann) Goodreau of Azle, Texas and Mrs. Levi (Rita) White of Molra; two sons, Paul of R.D. 1, North Lawrence and Douglas of Canton; a sister, Mrs. George (Agnes) Roberts of Fort Lauderdale, Fla.; a brother, Robert of South Colton; 17 grandchildren; six great-grandchildren; and several nieces and nephews. He is predeceased by a daughter, Mary, who died in 1962.

Mr. White was born Aug. 25, 1908 in St. Regis Falls, the son of John and Julianne Dunn White. He married Martha M. Newton on Jan. 7, 1937 in North Lawrence.

Mr. White farmed in the Nicholville area for over 25 years, retiring in 1973.

He does not spy but he watches. He does not dictate but he guides. And he does not guard but he protects. He is frequently seen around campus with his friendly face and wearing a badge and a stetson hat.

Who is he? He is the mascot for Potsdam College's new Crime Prevention Program.

The Crime Prevention Program has been in existence for a few years. However, it wasn't until the recent addition of two officers to the Public Safety Department that the growth of the program was possible.

"We want to continue making the campus safe. This is the basis for the program. It has been designed to coordinate with efforts of other State University of New York Colleges," Russ Murray, assistant director of public safety said. Murray works closely with Officer Rick McCabe, who he credited with the program's increased publicity and the design of the department's mascot.

Two main components of the program are Awareness and Operation I.D.

"There is a great deal of apathy among students and awareness will help overcome this," Murray said. Awareness helps students realize that, even in a small community, crime does exist. This problem can be minimized with knowledge or awareness.

The second component is Operation I.D., which enables students to have their valuables engraved with a

number that will be registered with Public Safety. If the item is stolen and then recovered by public safety, it can be returned to its owner because of the identification number. Operation I.D. applies only to students residing on campus.

A nationwide survey indicated that the primary crime on campuses is petty larceny. "Although Potsdam's campus is safe, the college has spent \$300,000 over the past three years for the replacement of dorm furniture," Bill Fisher, director of college services and public safety said.

Fisher also indicated that the training of personnel and the education of students through literature will aid development of the program. With the college's budget becoming tighter each year, this is more difficult. "Creative management is a necessity," he said.

The success of the program depends on many variables. "Even if the program helps a small percentage of the college community, then it has been successful," said Murray.
