A luncheon featuring homemade pea soup and homemade vegetable soup, assorted sandwiches and ice cream sundaes will be served from 11 a.m. until all are served.

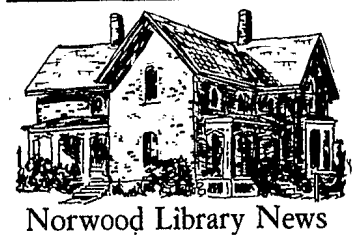
This year the guild will have a Christmas table, handmade items, handmade toys, fresh wreaths, jewelry, a children's booth and a food table.

## 'The Parent's Choice' Workshop Offered

Potsdam Central Schools, in conjunction with St. Lawrence-Lewis BOCES, will present two parent workshops. One of these workshops is planned for parents of elementary school age children and the other for parents of middle school age children. These workshops are designed to help parents discuss the growth and development of their school age children and identify ways to cope with problem areas.

The first part of the program, planned for parents of middle school age children, will be held on Nov. 30, at A. A. Kingston Middle School cafeteria. It will focus on identifying the major concerns of that age group. The second part of the middle school program will help parents develop ways to deal with their children's behavior. It will take place on Dec. 7. Both sessions will be held in the A. A. Kingston Middle School cafeteria from 7 to 9 p.m.

A similar pair of workshops will be held at Lawrence Avenue Elementary School. Problems of the elementary age group will be discussed. The first session will take place on Dec. 2 and the second one will be held on Dec. 13. Both sessions will be held in the Lawrence Avenue Elementary School cafeteria and will run from 7 to 9 p.m. The format will be similar to the middle school workshop.

"The Parents Choice" workshops will be led by Ms. Harriett Swan, who directs the training program at BOCES. There is no charge for attendance and all parents are welcome. Refreshments will be served and an informal discussion-type atmosphere is planned.

**NEWSBRIEF**

CANTON — All dairy farmers are invited to attend a meeting, sponsored by the St. Lawrence County Farm Bureau, to inform dairy farmers on the current dairy situation, to be held from 1 to 4 p.m. Dec. 2 at Canton ATC auditorium. This meeting is expected to attract farmers from Clinton, Franklin, Jefferson and St. Lawrence Counties.

Robert Smith, information director for the New York Farm Bureau will bring the group up to date on the present milk surplus situation, Farm Bureau Policy, the 50-cent deduction per hundredweight, and outline several possible alternatives to the current policy.

Jon Tarallo was appointed as a substitute bus driver and Mrs. Jean Flacco appointed as substitute nurse for the school district.

A substitute nurse's salary was established as well as an account for

the junior high honor society.

Upward bound funds (a program for potential dropouts) have been cut and will now serve three or four selected members of the schools to receive these funds.

An insurance payment in compensation for the damaged boiler at Norfolk Elementary School totaling \$5,104.50 was received.

Discussion focused on tax increases for townships within the school district and the effect on school taxes if Norfolk goes the full value tax rate. Norfolk, now paying the highest tax of any town, also holds the majority of taxable properties within the school district.

In the 1982-83 school year Norfolk paid \$624,452 compared to \$199,958 paid the 1972-73 school year; Potsdam paid \$308,913 compared to \$118,909 paid in 1972-73; while Stockholm paid \$47,744.44 compared to \$3,990.27. Michelle paid \$32.92 in 1972-73 compared to \$3,426.36 paid in 1982-83 school year.

## Knowles Doll Featured

A doll from the Knowles family is featured in the Potsdam Museum through the month of December. The displayed wax-over-composition doll is probably from the 1840's period and may have belonged to the daughter of Henry and James Knowles, Rosa, who was born in 1844 and lived in Potsdam at 48 Elm St. The stolid expression on the doll's face is characteristic of the English dolls of that period.

The wax-over-composition head has stationary glass eyes and is attached to a fabric body. The arms, from elbows down, are leather and the fingers are not sewn together. The wig of human hair is inserted at the top of the head and arranged from central parting, falling in ringlets over the ears. She wears an original gown of checkered taffeta with pink horizontal stripes and pink fringed shawl. The two petticoats and long pantaloons correspond to the fashion of that period.

The doll was given to the museum by the Knowles family.
