

Hockey Tournament Set For Olympic Center

The Key Bank College Hockey Tournament, one of the premier holiday competitions, makes its second appearance at the Olympic Center Dec. 2-9 with Boston College, St. Lawrence University, Cornell and Concordia vying for honors.

Opening round pairings on Tuesday the 28th have Boston College facing Cornell at 5:30 p.m. and Concordia meeting St. Lawrence in the 8:30 p.m. nightcap. The consolation and championship games are set for 5:30 and 8:30 p.m., respectively on Wednesday, the 29th.

"The Olympic Regional Development Authority is conducting the event under the sponsorship of Key Bank of Northern New York NA, a Key Bank Inc. subsidiary with offices in Jefferson, Lewis, Oswego, Essex, St. Lawrence and Franklin counties.

The inaugural competition, won by Clarkson, had no major sponsor, but was affiliated with the New York State Commerce Department and was billed as the "I Love New York" Tournament.

St. Lawrence, 19-11 last season and sixth in the ECAC Division I standings, has 20 returning lettermen, including goalie Gray Weiler. The Saints' netminder led the ECAC with a 2.92 goals against average, stopping 90.3 percent of the shots on goal.

Concordia is one of the leading teams in Canadian intercollegiate hockey. The Slingshots won the Quebec University Athletic Association crown last season with a 21-2-1 record and went on to place third in the Canadian

Intercollegiate Hockey Championships. The Paul Arsenault-coached Montreal club went 33-9-3 overall.

Cornell, meanwhile, appears to be resurging after a 12-13-1 campaign. The traditional Ivy League power has 18 lettermen returning for first-year coach Lou Reyroff. The leading scorer for the Big Red is Garry Cullen (18-17-35).

Boston College placed fourth in the ECAC last season with a 13-8 mark. The Eagles of veteran coach Len Ceglarski were 19-11 overall. There are 13 lettermen in uniform and five freshmen who were drafted by the National Hockey League.

Snow Making Efforts Increased

There is no question that we moved a little bit closer to winter this past week. Most of the northeastern ski areas picked up about three to five inches of snow. The main weather feature was the cold weather that will enable many of the areas to make a lot of snow. Whiteface is now open from the mid-station down to the base of the lifts A and 1-B, and the state is intending to keep the area open for the rest of the winter. I understand that Tupper is supposed to open this week, but I did not confirm this fact. I do know that Edgar Fletcher, the manager of Big Tupper, wanted to have the area open by the first weekend of December.

Killington, as I mentioned last week, has been open since October 17. By press-time there should be at least a dozen trails that are open covering about 10 miles of skiing. Since the area makes snow around-the-clock when the temperatures are below freezing, there should be a rapid increase in the number of trails that are open in the next two weeks even if it does not snow. Killington has a total of 37 miles of trails that are now covered by snowmaking and the snowmaking exists on 49 different trails. This means that Killington has so much snowmaking that it can operate all 15 lifts without any natural snow, and the artificial stuff can now cover 294 of the 544 acres that you can ski. No one in the East can even come close to this amount of snowmaking.

Killington also built the longest lift-served ski trail in the United States during the summer. It is called the Juggernaut and is 10 miles long! The trail is designed for the novice or even the beginning skier and it has only a six percent grade. It is possible for everyone to ski from the summit of Killington regardless of the level of ability. Juggernaut descends through an entirely new mountain and ski area that was purchased last spring. The new area is called the Northwest Passage, and it is serviced by a triple chair that is nearly two miles long.

The Northwest Passage triple chair lift is probably the longest chair lift in the world. The new lift provides mostly novice skiing and is especially designed for those who are afraid to go to a big name area because the trails are too difficult. One trail from the top of Sunrise Mountain where one gets off the new triple chair is a real easy 4.4 mile long run.

If you have a lot of time and money, but it seems that the money never goes far enough when you want to ski,

there is a way to reduce the cost of skiing just a little bit. If you ski and travel a lot, you can join the United States Ski Association. The address is USAA, Olympic Training Center, 1750 E. Boulder St., Colorado Springs, Colo. If you join early enough, there are some great discounts. You ski free twice at Vernon Valley and Great Gorge; there is a weekend of free skiing at Attitash, N.H.; and you can ski mid-week four times at half price at Snow Ridge and Big Tupper. As a member you get as much as a \$75 dollar reduction on all plane fares on Continental Airlines which is a good deal if you are able to ski out west.

Further, you can ski twice for just \$8 at Gore Mountain and half price twice at Sugarloaf in Maine. The problem with all of this bargain hunting is that you still have to do a lot of traveling, but if you ski a lot at nearby areas like Tupper, Snow Ridge, Gore and Hunter you can make it pay. Annual dues are only \$20.

The weather for the coming week promises to be on the warm side, and the temperatures should slow the making of snow. No major storm is in sight for most of the week.
