The Green and Gold had two opportunities to take the lead into the locker room in the waning seconds of the overtime period in the championship matchup of the Weston Tip-Off basketball tournament, but could only watch helplessly as the ball rolled off the rim and into the hands of a Concordia defender.

The lead throughout the second half, changed hands as many times as the teams changed direction as both squads engaged in a see-saw battle which ended only with the final buzzer.

Since its inception four years ago, the Clarkson Golden Knights have not only hosted the annual Weston's Tip-Off Tournament, they have owned it.

Larries Hoop Preview

How do you make up for 40 points a game?

That's the question St. Lawrence Central Basketball coach, Joe Jubinville will have to answer if the Larries are to come close to last season's fine 13-5 overall record.

Jubinville has lost the bulk of the Larries scoring attack entering the 1982-83 season with the graduation of standouts Pat Jones (20.1 points per game) and Jeff Truax (19.5 points per game). How well St. Lawrence Central can fill the gap will probably determine how far the Larries can move up in the standings this season.

St. Lawrence Central does have the potential for filling that scoring gap with four seniors returning to this year's squad. Point guard Dan Truax, a starter the last two years, is expected once again to direct the Larries offense. Dan Truax led the squad in assists last year and contributed 11 points per game to St. Lawrence Central's offense. Senior guard Dennis Lynch (nine points per game last year) completes the backcourt; with two part-time players last year, Mike Smith and Don Premo leading the front line. Sophomores Chris Hall and Leon Jones and junior Kevin Tally will be vying for the fifth starting position.

Jubinville stated that he looks for St. Regis and Bruston to be the teams to beat this season, with Madria close behind. He stated that he expects the Larries to be in the pack right behind them, but if a scorer emerges from the St. Lawrence Central ranks, look out for the Larries this year.

Potsdam High's wrestling program literally got a new lease on life when Ralph Gabriel took over as coach and Gabriel intends to make the most of it as the 1982-1983 wrestling season gets underway this week.

The Stoners open their wrestling season by hosting formidable Malone on Wednesday. The matches start at 6:30 p.m.

Freshmen include Sean Burcum, Scott Jessmer and Richard Carey. These three freshmen are expected to see a lot of action.

Clarkson, SLU In Top 10

Clarkson College and St. Lawrence University who have shown the magic touch for one-goal wins are both ranked in the Top 10 of the College Hockey Statistics Poll announced on Sunday. Clarkson stands seventh while SLU is 10th; Providence heads the Eastern rankings standing third.

Minnesota-Duluth and Minnesota run one-two followed by Providence, Bowling Green, Michigan State, Wisconsin, Clarkson, Notre Dame, Michigan Tech and SLU.

The Clarkson Golden Knight skaters chalked up two more wins during the holiday break, but the victories didn't come easy. On Thanksgiving night Clarkson defeated a hard hitting Concordia team 3-2 in overtime and on Sunday night in Hanover, N.H., the Knights edged Dartmouth 3-2. The wins bring their overall record to 6-0-1 and ECAC record to 2-0-1.

Freshman center Mike Harvey's two goals including the game winner with 12 seconds remaining in the extra period, powered Clarkson over the Stingers from Concordia. Sophomore Gord Sharpe scored the first Clarkson goal on a power play in the second period. Deron Bauer and Bob Armstrong recorded the assists. Armstrong assisted on all three Clarkson goals. Colin Patterson also assisted on Harvey's game winning goal.

The Knights outshot Concordia 46-30. Jim Falle had 28 saves in net for the Green and Gold.

On Sunday night at Rupert Thompson Arena, Clarkson's offense at last sputtered against Dartmouth for the first two periods before finally coming alive in the third.

Dartmouth's Scott Borek scored first in the contest with a marker at 10:45 first period. At 11:37 second period Clarkson left winger Pat Haramis evened the score. Assisting on the goal were Bob Armstrong and Bruce McDonough. Just over a minute later on a power play, Borek scored again for Dartmouth to give the Big Green a 2-1 second period lead.

Clarkson battled back in the third period with Haramis scoring again at 3:26. Deron Bauer and Andy Otto recorded the assists.

Knight captain Colin Patterson notched the game winner with six minutes remaining in the contest.

SLU Ends "Best Season" Just Short Of Bowl Bid

ROCK ISLAND, Ill. — Division III playoff football games always seem to develop into free-wheeling shootouts...it just seems to be the nature of the beast. St. Lawrence University has been involved in several over the years, but the Saints' storybook 1982 season ended on Saturday one chapter short in a monstrous 14-0 defensive donnybrook with Augustana College.

Both sides forged a strong case for the defense all afternoon with a trip to the NCAA Championship game at stake. The game was billed a matchup between the Saints' air corps and the Vikings infantry which had ground out almost 300 yards per game.

Defenses Steal Center Stage

The opposing defenses stole the thunder, however, as gangly tackles and near perfect secondary coverage precipitated all afternoon. The Saints' offense was superb allowing the Vikings only one scoring drive. The Viking defense was spectacularly intercepting five Mark Ferrante passes with the fourth being returned 95 yards for a touchdown by Doug McCoy to snuff an 11th hour bid by the Saints.

The Vikings also used first half interceptions by Mark Long, Pete Vernon and Mike Pendergast to thwart the Saints, who more than doubled (90-45) the Vikings in the offensive output. In the second half the momentum shifted and the Saints were contained far from scoring range until Bill Woods recovered a fumble at the Augustana 25-yard line.

The fumble recovery eventually led to a short punt by Augustana's Tim Miller from the Vikings' seven yard. The shanked punt gave the Saints' one final try as they started from the 33 but moved back to midfield by a major penalty.

Undaunted the Saints gained a first down on the Augustana 15 on a 12-yard screen pass to Mike Wright and 23 more on a pass interference penalty. But the Augustana defense arose for one more big play as McCoy masterfully stepped in front of a sideline pass at the five yard line and raced 95 yards (ala Lawrence Taylor) to paydirt.

Vikings Score In Third Quarter

The lone Augustana touchdown of the day came on their second thrust inside the Saints' 10 yardline in the third quarter. The first was set up by a 40-yard punt return by Craig Allison and ended as Todd Miller missed a 21-yard field goal attempt.

The scoring drive started after a 15-yard penalty on punt coverage moved the Vikings from their own 18 to the 33. Quarterback Lance Hoyer, a transfer from Illinois who has won all of his 20 starts for the Vikings, started the drive in motion with one of only two pass completions of the day on a 16-yard strike to Norm Singbush.

Hoyer who was injured in the later stages of the first half then combined with Allison to pick up most of the remaining yardage to the goal line. A 20-yard bolt by Allison set the table and he also served up the six-point meal scampering the last four yards on a sweep.

Miller then added the first of two extra points on the day.

The Vikings' defense could be credited to both as they limited the Saints to only 24 plays in the second half while Augustana ran off 40. The Vikings' success stifling the Saints' air game was a combination of great man-to-man secondary coverage gambling blitzes against SLU quarterback Mark Ferrante.

Ferrante finished with only eight completions in 22 attempts for 96 yards. The Saints added 108 yards on the ground with Keith Henry leading all ball-carriers with 76 yards on 23 punishing carries. The Vikings limited to 45 yards in the first half picked up 150 yards on the ground and 18 through the air in the second.

Allison who gained only 18 yards in the first half picked up 68 aftermidion while Dave Elie ran for 65 and Hoyer 59.

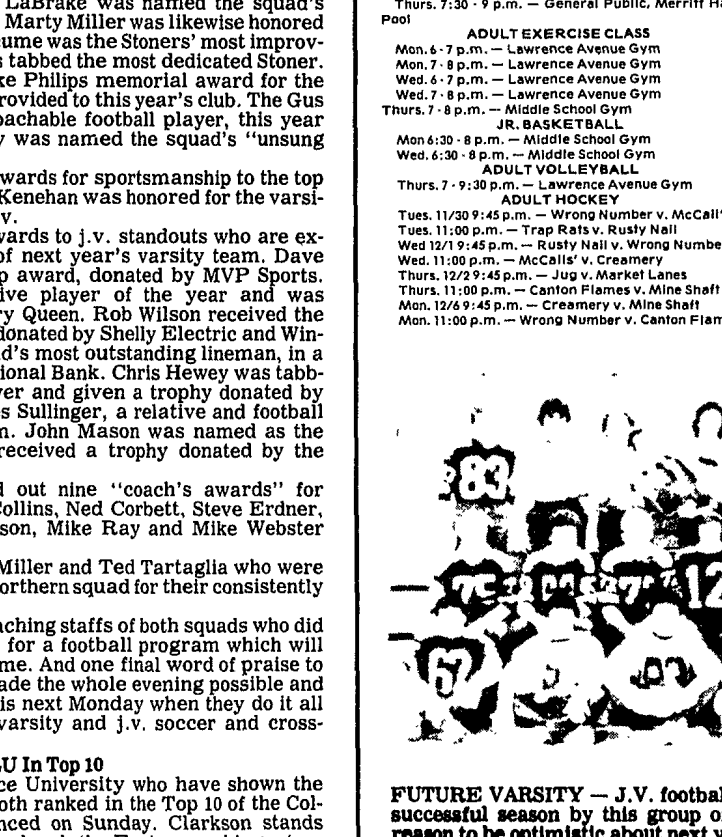

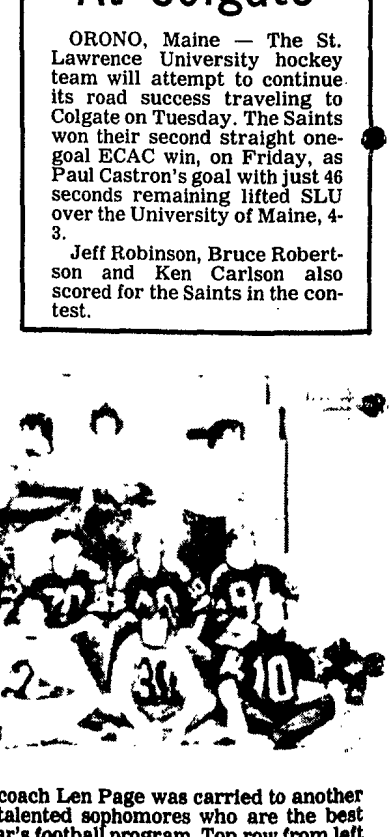
