Firewood Offered For Sale By Lottery

CANTON—The St. Lawrence County Legislature through the efforts of the County Forestry Department will again offer to sell firewood from county-owned land.

The Forestry Department manages 24,000 acres of forest land in the county and from this, 95 individual contracts will be given out for cutting. A lottery is used to determine the wood cutters, due to the increased demand for wood as a home heating fuel. A maximum of five standard cords will be sold per family at a cost of \$10 per cord. To get the wood out applicants must have a tractor, horses, oxen, etc.

Most of the wood sales will be located in the Towns of Hopkinton and Parishville but wood will also be sold in Brasher, Colton, Hermon, and Pitcairn. Applications and further information on the location of sale areas can be picked up at the St. Lawrence County Forester's Office, 5 Pearl St., Canton, or can be obtained by sending a self-addressed, stamped envelope, to the forester's office.

Applications will be accepted until 5

p.m. Jan. 27 and the drawing will be held on Jan. 28. The cutting of these sales will begin in the late spring, as soon as weather permits, and continue through the summer.

In 1982 the county sold 375 cords of firewood which helped to heat the homes of over 75 families. Along with firewood, the county forester Joseph Kutsko, markets sawtimber, pulpwood, and cabin poles. This forest land is also open to the public for year round recreational use and enjoyment.
