Cold weather is hard on animals too. Cats and dogs should not be left outside for long periods of time. They need protection from wind, snow, rain and a warm, dry place in which to sleep.

Awareness of the following hazards can make life safer for our pets: — The sweet taste of antifreeze attracts animals, but the chemical can be deadly. Check your car hoses for leaks and if spilled wipe up immediately.

— Chemicals that melt snow and ice can also harm pets. After your pet's walk, wipe off his feet with a damp towel.

— Cold cats like to cuddle up near warm car engines. Be sure to bang on the hood before starting the car to alert felines. Keeping your cat indoors, of course, is the safest and most comfortable for your cat.

Forest Preserve Map Is Offered

Environmental Conservation Commissioner Henry G. Williams has announced that a new edition of DEC's four-part land map of the Adirondack Forest Preserve is now available.

The map shows the location of state land lying within the patents, townships, tracts, lots and subdivisions of the Adirondack area. The new edition includes state land acquisitions through April 30, 1983, and is the first updating of this information since 1964.

A previous edition published in 1977 corrected the location of the Adirondack Forest Preserve boundary, known as the "Blue Line," but no state land holdings were updated on that edition.

A copy of the Adirondack land map, which is approximately 55 inches by 72 inches in size, may be obtained for \$6 from the Information and License Sales Office, Department of Environmental Conservation, Room 111, 50 Wolf Road, Albany, 12233. Orders must be accompanied by a check or money order made out to N.Y.S. Department of Environmental Conservation. There has been no increase in the price for this map.
