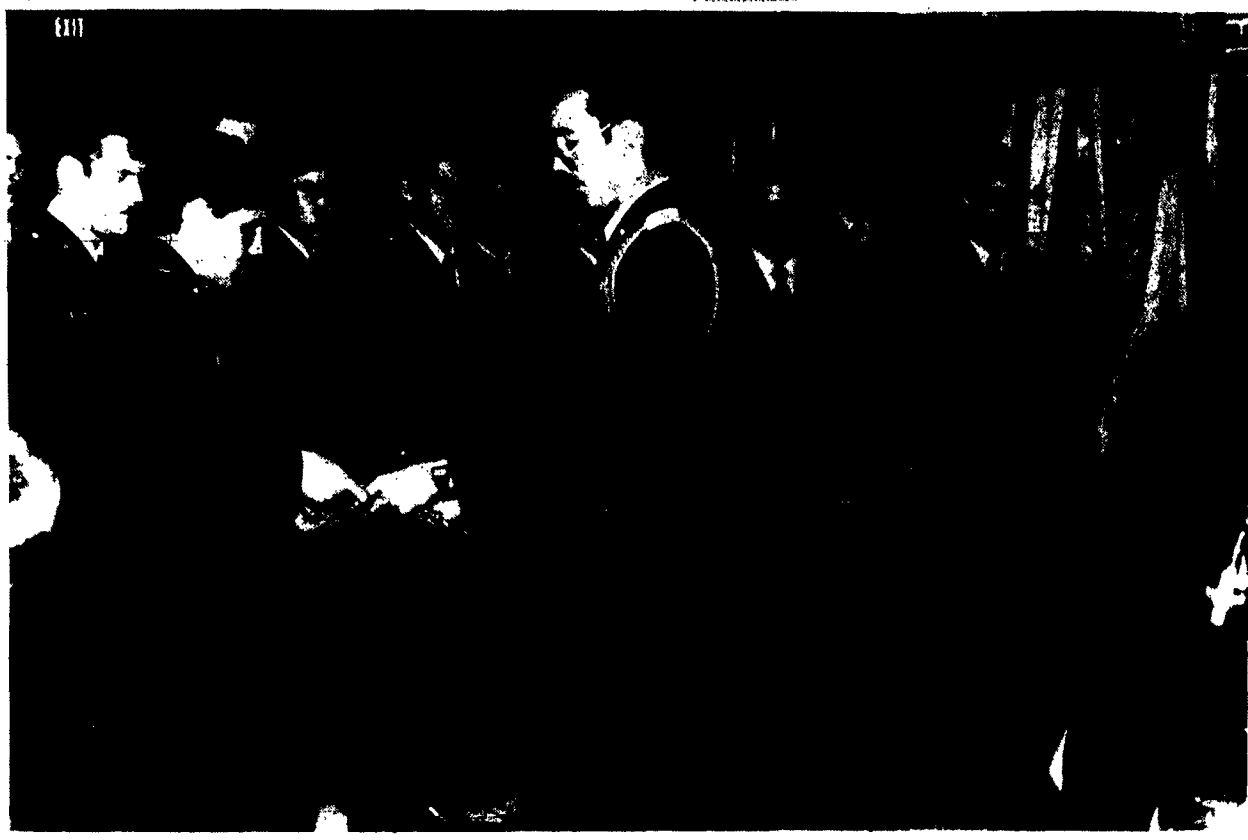

## Towns Could Get Dump Reprieve

**ALBANY** — Town dumps in the county facing Department of Environmental Conservation closure orders will probably be granted extensions to operate until the proposed countywide solid waste incinerator is in the air, Commissioner Henry Williams has told St. Lawrence County officials.

The Town of Potsdam sanitary landfill is one of those slated to be closed later this year under DEC orders.

"We don't expect our facility to be on line to comply with those closure orders," Solid Waste Authority Chairman Robert McNeil told the commissioner. Town supervisors are worried about possible fines for operating their dumps after their deadlines for closure, he said, or finding other places for the waste.

"If we can identify a very clear program we're not going to come in and cut your legs out from under you. The problem is when we get jerked around with promises, promises," the commissioner said, referring to several proposed solid waste projects around the state which have had state money allocated to them in the early 1970's but have stalled or gone bankrupt.

"You've shown an awful lot of good sense. I know the sentiment around the table was not positive," Williams said about his meeting with the county's town supervisors last year.

"But there's no way the towns are ever going to get the resources." The only way St. Lawrence County can solve its solid waste problems is on a county-wide basis, he said.

"If it's a case of being sensible and we receive a clear schedule, then we'll work something out," Williams said.

## Paul Smith's Faculty Offers Information

**PAUL SMITHS** — Kirk Peterson and Kenneth West, Paul Smith's College faculty members, and David DeSantis, assistant superintendent of the Franklin-Essix-Hamilton Board of Cooperative Educational Services, are the co-editors of North Country Micro, a newsletter that is helping area educators stay on top of the computer revolution.

North Country Micro, published five times a year, is in its fourth year in helping bring together the geographically diverse North Country educators. The area the Micro serves, 2,500 square miles, has less than four pupils per square mile enrolled in elementary and secondary education.

"I've noticed a coming together of instructors to work on common problems," commented DeSantis on one positive aspect of computers entering the teaching profession.

The publication goes out to 1,300 educators and interested readers in the elementary, secondary and college institutions in the tri-county area.

The cooperative publication features editorials, applications of existing software to education, reviews

of hardware and systems, updates on what school systems are doing in respect to computer education and education by computers, and bibliographies for further study.

Paul Smith's College, a two-year, independent college located in Franklin County, boasts a computer lab containing 14 TRS 80 computers and four Apple II graphic display computers. The lab is open to all students enrolled at the college.

In addition, computer assisted instruction is being provided to students with deficiencies in math.

The college, with strong programs

in hotel and restaurant management and forestry, also offers students in these programs the opportunity to learn the computer's application to those fields of study.

Paul Smith's also offers a technical communications major, which is transferable to a bachelor of science program.

In an area where distance between schools can be measured in hundreds of miles, the North Country Micro has helped educators feel they are a "bit" closer and has taken the "byte" out of keeping up with modern classroom technology.
