

Stockholm Town Board Reorganizes For '84

STOCKHOLM — A public hearing of the Stockholm Town Board was held Jan. 5 at the Municipal Building, Winthrop, for a variance at the William Washington property for an automotive shop, a craft shop and antique shop. The only persons who appeared were William Washington and Walter Frary, Jr. The town board approved a variance for Washington and Jean Sheehan.

The annual organizational meeting of the Stockholm Town Board was held at 7 p.m., following the hearing. The time and place for regular meetings was set for the second Tuesday of each month at 7 p.m. in the Municipal Building, Winthrop.

The salaries of town officers and terms of payment were set as follows for the year 1984: supervisor, \$5,000 (same as 1983); deputy supervisor, \$3,500 (same as last year); town clerk, \$7,500 (the same as last year); town justice, \$4,000 (same as last year); keeper for the town justice, \$1,000 or \$4 per hour; councilman Joseph Robinson, Arthur Sweeney, Daniel Chambers and Robert Scott, each, \$1,600; tax collector, \$2,300 (\$2,000 last year); chairman of the assessors, Kermit Blanchard, \$3,100 plus \$75 per day school (\$2,800 last year); assessors Floyd Deleel and Bruce Cheney, each \$1,800 plus \$75 each per day school, \$1,500 last year; superintendent of highways, \$10,000 last year; zoning administrator, fire and building inspector, Edward Tanner, \$650 (same as last year); sewer rent collector, \$500 (same as last year); sewer attendant, \$1,400 (same as last year); registrar of vital statistics, \$50 (same as last year); inspectors of elections: registration day, \$50 per diem; primary day, \$50 per diem; and election day, \$75 (same as last year); custodian of voting machines, Kermit Dyke, \$300 (same as last year).

 Councilmen Arthur Sweeney and Daniel Chambers were appointed as the Sewer Committee.
 Councilmen Joseph Robinson and Arthur Sweeney were appointed as the Highway Committee.
 The Key Bank of Northern New York, Winthrop, was designated the bank for 1984.
 The Massena Observer and Potsdam Courier and Freeman were designated as the town newspapers.
 The sum of \$25 was reappropriated petty cash, each, for the Town Clerk and Tax Collector.
 The limit for spending for the Highway Superintendent is \$500 for small tools.
 The mileage rate for town officials, on town business, was set at 25 cents per mile, the same as last year.
 Supervisor Lincoln Chapman was authorized to sign the rescue squad contract.

William Compeau was re-appointed sewer assistant.
 Floyd Rockwood was re-appointed dog control officer.
 Loren Furgison was re-appointed to the board of grievance review for a four year term. Other members are: Warren Tracy, Dec. 31, 1984; and William Dubois, Dec. 31, 1985.

 Doug Arquette had resigned as a member of the planning board. Stanley Crump was appointed to fill the unexpired term of office, until Dec. 31, 1986. Councilman Daniel Chambers also resigned as a member, and Donald Carson was appointed to fill this unexpired term of office which will expire Dec. 31, 1984. Leo Lynch was re-appointed to a four year term to the planning board. Other members are: Madeline Decker, Dec. 31, 1986; William Dubois, Dec. 31, 1985; Gary Ware, Dec. 31, 1985; and Clifford Brothers, Dec. 31, 1984.

Robert Reagan was re-appointed to the board of appeals for four years; and Augustus Marscher was appointed to replace Councilman Robert Scott, who resigned.  The re-apportionment balances from 1984 to 1984 are: general, \$76,669.54; highway, \$73,443.95; sewer, \$185.11; recreation, \$123.41; and federal revenue, \$2,654.57.
 The regular meeting of the Stockholm Town Board will be held at 7 p.m., Jan. 10, in the Municipal Building, Winthrop. It will be preceded at 6 p.m. by the annual audit meeting.

Town Historian Notes 1983 Highlights

Editor's note: The following is the 1983 annual report to the Town of Potsdam of Town Historian Susan C. Lyman, Mrs. Lyman, a Norwood resident, is also Village of Norwood Historian.

The year 1983, was an interesting and challenging one for this historian. Early in the year the Norwood Jaycees named me the Norwood Senior Citizen of the Year. In January I was elected secretary of the St. Lawrence County Council of Senior Citizens.

I completed a questionnaire for the local history committee and spent some time with Dr. Peter Falk who was gathering data on local historical sites of former industry and Indian villages for a Niagara Mohawk Power Corp. survey. Later Mr. and Mrs. Peter Pratt came to my home for an

afternoon of information gathering on similar matters regarding the right of way for power lines for Niagara Mohawk Power Corp.

In March I spent several hours with three gifted/ talented Norwood-Norfolk Central School students working on the Norwood and St. Lawrence Railroad, Russell Atwater and Norwood co-founder Charles McCarty. I helped many other students at all levels and served as a resource person to the reporters on two area newspapers.

On April 9, I attended the county historians' spring workshop and in June I was at the annual workshop held on the Paul Smith's College campus.

The Norwood Congregational Church observed its 125 anniversary with a three-day calendar of events. I attended each service and donated pictures and clippings I had written

over the years.

I did a study of the stained glass windows in the Methodist Church and wrote an article which was printed in the Heritage Sunday bulletin and in the local newspapers.

September saw the 13th annual art and crafts show in Norwood with a walking tour, museum open house and art contest for children and adults. I served as museum hostess and also as a judge in the contest.

I acted as museum guide and resource person many times. I did a taping of a veteran business man and a railroad man, talking about the life a half-century ago.

The Potsdam relief route was officially named "Sandstone Drive."

Downtown Potsdam presents an attractive appearance as the historical revitalization in progress continues and the store fronts assume the distinctive decor of earlier days. The village received a top community award at the Main Street New York Conference this past fall.

Baldwin Acres, Norwood's senior citizen housing complex, opened in May. A historical downtown Norwood revitalization is being sought.

The Norwood Fire Department 24-member band, "The Brass Firemen," has been invited to perform at the 1984 Olympic opening ceremony at Sarajevo, Yugoslavia on Feb. 8. A fund raising drive is now underway.

Dr. Henry Vinicor, retired general practitioner, was honored by the New York State Medical Association for giving half a century of service in the medical profession. Dr. Vinicor's radio talk show, "House Call" heard on WMSA Massena, has been nationally acclaimed.

Dr. Robert Collins, a Potsdam physician since 1949, was honored by being named a life-time honorary member of the Canton-Potsdam Hospital staff.

The year 1984 will mark the 200th anniversary of Methodist in North America and I will research and write a paper on the subject.

I will be available for students when they begin the spring term with local history projects.

I did the routine tasks of a local historian; I kept the cemetery listing up to date, the day-to-day scrapbooks current, answered numerous genealogy queries and added many items to my open-end special interest scrapbooks. As usual I visited the abandoned cemeteries in the township.

I wish to thank all town and village officers and employees for all the help given me during the past year, it was all greatly appreciated.

Real Estate Courses Set

Canton ATC will offer two State of New York Department of State approved real estate courses needed by professionals for licensure and/or relicensure.

This class will meet on consecutive Tuesdays through April 10. A two-hour final examination will be administered on April 11.

Preservationists Wanted For Annual State Awards

ALBANY — The New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation is accepting nominations for the 1984 New York State Historic Preservation Awards.

"These awards recognize individuals and organizations who have demonstrated outstanding achievement in the preservation of New York's historic resources," explained Commissioner Orin Lehman, who oversees the awards program in his role as State Historic Preservation Officer.

The annual awards recognize exemplary preservation efforts and the application of creative solutions to difficult preservation problems. They are presented for achievements in a variety of professional preservation disciplines including architecture, archeology and landscape architecture.

Associated fields, such as craftsmanship, planning, journalism, preservation education, economic development, and preservation research, are also included. To be eligible, projects or programs should be completed or substantially underway at the time of the nomination. Awards are presented separately for projects or programs in the public and the private sectors.

Nominations must be submitted on forms which will be provided on request by the Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation. Nomination deadline is March 1, 1984. The awards will be presented during Preservation Week in May.
